PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2005/2006

The AGM of the Adelaide Branch will be held on Thursday, 1st June, 2006. Here is a summary of what has happened over the last 9 months, and what a busy 9 months it's been!!

Adelaide Branch sent out invitations to all Branches and riding groups suggesting a meeting to be held at Pendleton Farm to discuss the future of the Odyssey event. In October '05, as President, I hosted and facilitated the inaugural Inter Branch Meeting at Pendleton Farm. This meeting was attended by a large cross section of branch representatives. It was unanimously decided that

• the Odyssey is to be held in all districts of the state, north, south, east and west; each event will have its own character and identity, indicative of the district, so that it gives all members the opportunity to participate

• there will be an Inter Branch meeting at each Odyssey to determine where the future Odyssey will be held, and the destination of the Odyssey will be known two years in advance, to give members time to plan and budget for the event.

This further strengthened the branch networks.



We met 6pm at the main gates of Adelaide Oval on a lovely evening and began by adjusting our cameras to 'cloudy' conditions, working out the resolution that we may want and experimenting with the use of tripods. We began by photographing the statues at a distance and working up closer to include a rose in the foreground and finally to a close-up of the tiny print in the heel of Sir Donald Bradman. St Peter's Cathedral was framed and re-framed by trees and Hercules' tiny bits weren't forgotten. (An interesting side observation here was the fact that virtually all had to squint at or, in the case of glasses, tilt the head up to focus on the camera screens be they large or small.)

After a short break to await sunset, we re-grouped at water's edge, literally, across from Elder Park, to snap the unexpected sights and colour of the gathering crowd for the 'Carols Under the Stars', with paddleboats and a gondola plying the waters of Torrens Lake in the foreground while reflecting the lights, activities and sunset.





Normally, committee work is good fun, working with others to organise things and making new



What Adelaide's been up to....

The Sixth Midnight to Dawn Poker Run

It was "Hot, Dammmed Hotttt!!!!" Saturday January 21 was predicted to be 41^o and at 4:40pm it

topped out at 43.1°. At 11:30 it was still 38° and it did not go below 34.8° all night.

A number of die-hards started to turn up at 11:00 at the BP service station at Newton, for the eagerly awaited midnight run and paid their money to play the poker game. By midnight we had 25 bikes turn up and I had drunk two litres of water while waiting.

After a riders' briefing on the route we would be taking and a lecture on drinking water all through the run (so as not to become dehydrated) we headed off into the night.

Shortly after, however, I managed to foul up my entry to a right hand corner, stood it up and ran off the road, and had a very low speed encounter with the Armco. With no apparent damage, (with the exception of a bent bracket

holding the skateboard wheel) I regained the lead and headed up the Gorge Road and headed for our first regroup stop at Birdwood. On this stretch, I noticed the Tuono was getting hot and not cooling down as expected. Further inspection at Birdwood showed a broken "T" piece in the radiator plumbing and a loss of some coolant. Disaster! (It was actually much worse than

originally expected as this caused me to be awarded the "Trainer Wheels" award at the February meeting.) 

The Internet for old farts

Are you 'on the net'? If not, why not? Here is some info in question and answer form...

Q. Why would I want to use the internet?

A. To: Email friends/rellies -especially distant ones, including pictures off my digital camera. Look up information on any topic under the sun. Do banking (ie pay bills) from home. Look up the catalogue of my local library, and reserve books (they'll email me when they are ready to collect). Buy or sell on eBay (on-line auction site). Look up the TV programs. Listen to radio programs I can't receive off air (eg ABC). Check out the ride pictures on the various Ulysses sites, including the Adelaide one, as well as lots of other Ulysses-related stuff. See when the next ride is on, and where to, on the Adelaide Ulysses site. Look up the types and prices and sellers of things I want to buy. Order stuff (and pay for it), like paving bricks, or anything else I could possibly want to buy. Download songs, or videos. Make cheap 'phone' calls to local, long distance, or overseas destinations (eg 18c flat for a long-distance call). Download both free and purchased software. Get up to date drivers for my hardware (printer, scanner etc). So on and so on...

Q. How do I use the internet if I don't have a computer.

A. Go to a friend's house where they have net access. (Take a some stubbies or wine to lubricate the way). Go to my public library, where you use it for free, and will be able to get lessons.

Q. How do I send and receive emails if I'm using other people's or library computers?

A. Set up a free email address. There are plenty of sites which provide these. Google mail is one of the better ones, with the most available storage (at this time, 2.7GB). Yahoo and Hotmail are a couple of others.

Q. I have a computer. How do I get connected to the internet?

A. There are lots of answers to this, depending on how much you want to pay, what type of access you have available at your house, how fast you want the access to be, and how much data you are likely to download. The options are basically:

• **Dialup**: Most computers come with a built-in modem included. You plug the phone line into this to dial your ISP (Internet Service Provider) to connect to the net. Cost is around \$1 per hour (charged by the minute), plus the cost of a local phone call each time you connect. You can send a FAX over dialup. The disadvantage is that you can't make or receive phone calls while on the net. Anyone with a phone line can use dialup, though the connection speed may vary. Maximum of 56kbps (kilo bits per second, equates to 5.6 text characters per second).

• ADSL (Asymmetric Digital Subscriber Line): You have an ADSL modem between your computer and the phone line. Modem cost is between \$0 to around \$250 depending on access plan (with your ISP) and what facilities you want (eg WiFi). Connection cost (to get ADSL to your home) is from \$0 to \$110 depending on ISP and plan. Access fees are from around \$30 to \$70 per month. This gives an 'always connected' situation. The internet is just there. When you turn on your computer, it is connected. No local call cost per session. And the phone is still available for normal phone calls. Can't send or receive a FAX over an ADSL connection. Speed varies from 256kbps upwards depending on monthly fee. Can use VOIP (Voice Over Internet Protocol) to make cheap 'phone' calls.

• Cable: This is similar to ADSL, but over a Foxtel or Optus style TV cable. Usually more expensive than ADSL. Speed can be faster than ADSL, but bursty, and sometimes very slow.

• Wireless: Available in some areas, eg close to Adelaide city courtesy of ISP Chariot. This is also being rolled out to country areas, where the government is wearing the setup cost. Works as for ADSL, but the connection is via an antenna on the roof rather than the phone line. (So you can actually ditch your landline if you want.) Chariot's setup fee is currently \$250, then a monthly charge similar to ADSL fees, depending on requirements.

Q. What do I need on my computer if I connect to the internet?

A. Two essentials are a firewall program, and a virus checker which is kept up to date. These can be obtained for free. Other good utilities are programs to check for 'robots' and 'adware' put on the computer by internet sites or downloaded programs. These are also free.

Q. This is all too hard, where do I go for help?

A. Primarily friends. Seek out a knowledgeable friend, rellie, or neighbour for help. Ply them with food and drink if necessary. Magazines. Buy some computer magazines and get info from them. The internet. - Searching for help on any topic will find something.

Connecting a computer to the internet does add risk of damage to files on the computer, so it can't be done safely without knowledge of the risks and how to counter them.

Hopefully that is food for thought. More another time. The internet is a wonderful resource, with more information available than the best public library.
