6th February

Not the AGM Weekend at Meningie



Vietnam Rider

Seventeen Adelaide based motorcyclists had the pleasure of riding around North Vietnam in November – the memories will be with us forever as it was a fabulous trip.

You may remember that Top Gear visited Vietnam a couple of years ago, and that particular episode had me thinking that I too would like to do this. I happened to mention this at the Torrens Valley Branch meeting and 30 or so very interested people also thought that they too liked the idea.

After a short Internet search, we picked on a reputable Company in Vietnam to organize the tour, including the hiring of bikes, motel bookings back up bus for those that did not ride, two mechanics, the ride leader and general itinerary for a 13 day tour of North Vietnam.

When all the prices were added up and the general plan agreed upon, the total cost was US\$1040 per rider and US\$650 per person in the bus. The bus was able to carry our luggage. This equated to US\$69 per day for the 15 days we were there – a true bargain which was further value added when the Aussie dollar obtained parity!! The airfare via Kuala Lumpur was AUS\$1100 to Hanoi which tempered our enthusiasm somewhat.

The big day arrived on November 4, 2010. By this time, as we departed Adelaide Airport, our numbers had dwindled down to 17 persons which was at the very limit of what the tour operator, Nam from Vietnam Rider, could handle anyway. It was to be his biggest ever tour.

After an uneventful trip to Hanoi, including an overnight stay at KL, we arrived keen and eager to get amongst the traffic – little did we know what was in store for us.

We were met by Nam and ushered into two busses for the inaugural indoctrination to life on the roads in Vietnam. First thought: "there are no road rules in Vietnam" which was still the thought at the end of the tour. Bikes were everywhere and comprised 95% of the traffic as they darted here and there in no particular pattern. Generally, they stuck to the right of the carriage-way, but many riders thought this was not an option and battled their way against the oncoming traffic anyway! Double lines mean nothing and are a waste of paint – we soon learnt to ignore them as well when stuck behind a slow moving vehicle. Helmet wearing is mandatory in Vietnam and this move has seen the motorcycle road toll decrease by 50% almost instantly, however, 20% of riders still ignore this law.

We arrived at our hotel in the Old Quarters in central Hanoi, the theory being that we did not ride in the city, as it was deemed just too adventurous for us at this tender stage of the trip. We battled on foot that night against the hoards of bikes to get to the café for our first Vietnamese meal, the food we were to enjoy for the rest of the trip.

At one particular intersection, four heavily trafficked roads all come together and we just stood there in amazement as hundreds of small motorcycles came together and shot out the cauldron to their chosen destination. It was like watching a washing machine full of socks - no road rage, no yelling, no collisions, no little piles of glass, just a smooth transition for all participants from the apparent chaos.

Next morning, we were taken out of the city to be introduced to our bikes, which were to be ours for the next 13 days. All bikes in Vietnam must be under 175cc and we soon found out why. The speed limits all across the country are mostly 50 kph, and to exceed this was often impossible because of the traffic density and the crappy road surfaces. So, 125cc bikes were more than adequate and we grew to like these little meanies a lot during the next two weeks. We scored 5 Yamaha YBR 125ccs, a commuter type of bike we do not see in Australia, 5 Honda Neo's scooters and the most controversial of the lot, 5 Russian made Minsks 125cc. These are refugees from the American War and closely resemble the BSA Bantam. They were certainly 'old school' with the need to mix two stroke oil with the petrol - they didn't even have a speedo! We all dodged them in the morning as we had a pre-arranged agreement to ride each bike in rotation, but by the end of the trip, we all had grown to like the little buggers, as they had the softest seat and handled the really crappy roads the best. After a short introductory zip around the car park, we were off on a 2000 km adventure.

We thought that riding on the opposite side of the road would test us the most, but, seeing that we were literally just following the leader, this came almost naturally. We soon began to know what was needed to make safe passage through the mayhem on the roads.

'Expect the unexpected' soon became our mantra – bikes just zoomed into our pathway from all directions, the riders oblivious of other road users. Animals sauntered around – we did not mind the chooks, but the water buffalo were a concern as they certainly had a huge presence. In one incident, a rider glanced off the side of a buffalo just missing those huge horns, with the following rider braking heavily and hitting head height into the animal's rear end. Luckily we did not have to pull the lady riders head from the 'dark area' under the tail. Many more hits were recorded on the trip with dogs, chooks, geese and some other animals we did not know the names of, all going under our wheels. One rider hit a policeman and after an active debate, all departed on good terms.

We were advised to take our Australia Licences as International Licences are not accepted in Vietnam, the only country in the World to not do so. "If you are pulled over, leave the negotiations to me," said Nam, our Leader.

One thing we all did was to don our green fluoro vests for the trip and what a great idea this turned out to be. Not only could we see where the other riders were away ahead of us, but the kids all thought we looked funny and cheered us wildly as we passed. We *thought* they were cheering anyway, but probably they were saying something along the lines of "Aussie wankers go home"

The scenery all the way was fantastic. We were in mountain ranges most of the time and rode up to 3,000 metres just before entering SaPa in the far north. The little bikes were straining in second gear most of the time, but kept on going. The Minsks, in particular, were in hard labour, emitting vast quantities of smoke. We tried to keep them apart to enable other riders to get some clear air, but they somehow always accumulated at the rear of the pack.

The price of fuel was around 70 cents a litre which to us was a bargain, but to the locals on \$10 on a week wage, it was a major commitment. Hence, the trucks were either small or have small motors making them slow in the hilly terrain, and often breaking down usually 'just around the corner'. When this happened, large boulders were rolled out to stop the trucks running backwards and repairs were done on the road. Oil was just dumped in-situ and when the repairs were concluded, the trucks just drove off leaving two massive rocks in the wheel paths for thrill seeking motorcyclists for battle with.

Large buffalo turds were also a concern along with crops drying on the pavement, large piles of road building material covering 50% of the road and even temporary buildings erected out to the middle of the road. As I said –'expect the unexpected'.

The pavements in general were poor but there is a massive road building program going on at the moment, but the recently opened roads I saw were almost instantly destroyed within the first week – a severe lack of sub-surface compaction was the reason, as the bitumen was just poured on the skimmed surface without sufficient compacted effort underneath. Road surfaces varied from 'great' to 'bomb craters'. At one stage, we were making forward progress by having to stand up on the bikes using first gear and this was through the main street of a large town. Dust was a constant companion.

We visited the Chinese Border three times during the trip and saw the opulence just across the border. The roads were much better and the buildings new and tidy.

At one stage, we were really in the backwaters and the people we met obviously had never seen a Westerner, and marveled at our height and physique as well as several well grown beards (on the blokes of course). Overall, the native tribes we met along the way were very friendly. School is compulsory for those up to the age of 15 and their knowledge of Australia left our knowledge of Vietnam for dead. The biggest and most decorated building in each town and city were schools – education is a top priority in Vietnam.

The Country is run under the communist system, but the only sign of this was the blacked out limousines seen on the road, the occasional morning propaganda speeches over the loud speaker systems and the Vietnamese flags proudly flown from the Party Leaders' houses. The capitalist system is rife and seems to sit easily next to the official communist ideals of the country.

Most days we averaged just 180 kms a day, which was more than adequate. One day ran into overtime and we were forced to ride in a very twisty, dangerous road under the cover of darkness, adding to the thrill of the ride. Many times we glanced down to see the valley below, some 700 metres with no guard rails. All this on a narrow carriage-way with oncoming traffic forcing us to virtually pull over and stop.

Each accommodation venue was pre-booked and it was a relief to finally make our destinations each night and settle into the clean comfortable hotel rooms we found in each place. Meals averaged out to \$10 a day and these varied from full on The little bikes ran almost faultlessly, and I am sure that Casey Stoner would be hard pressed to keep up as foot pegs scraped and horns tooted to warn of our coming passage. After each night the bikes were given a thorough check over by the travelling mechanics. The first thing to be checked was the horn to make sure it was in good working condition.

On the last two days, we really needed a relaxing time as we headed for Halong Bay on the east coast. This area is dotted with some 1900 islands and is a favourite tourist destination for all visitors to Vietnam. We had a whole ship to ourselves as we soaked up the sunshine and fabulous food and relived memories that would last us a life time.

It was with some reluctance that we jumped on the bikes for the last time in Vietnam and headed to Hanoi, and joined back into the frantic throng.

Crashes – yes we had a few with 8 of the 15 riders going down at some stage, but owing to the low speeds and good protective clothing, there were only bruises and dented prides that resulted.

The weather had been perfect with average day temperatures of 25 degrees, nights at 15 degrees and only one hour of rain for the whole time on the bikes.

We are still coming down from a high even though we have been back now for a few months. The scenery was breathtaking, the people were fascinating and friendly, the adventure riding was unbelievable and all for a song. We gave our mechanics and bus driver a good tip which would equate to quite a few months pay for them. The looks on their faces made us feel good as we all were 'millionaires' to them, which carried quite a feeling of guilt.

I thoroughly recommend a trip to Vietnam, especially the far north where tourism is just starting to gain a foot hold. We had a ball and there is talk of going again in two years time. We now have to obey double lines!!!

If you are willing to be a corner marshal then you just need to ride up front, but if you don't want the job then don't ride immediately behind the leader. The system works well if adhered to and lets everyone ride in confidence and that they will not get lost even if they cannot see any other riders.

To my fellow Ulyssians,

Can you imagine riding a pushbike 30 kilometres per day, over the worst possible roads you could imagine. Ruts in the road seem to reach up and try to swallow you, whilst the bumps are enormous. Often there is parts of the road that are so boggy you can't get through without getting off, or riding through the bush on the side of the road. And you do this every day! It is your job.

In November, I had the privilege to visit Northern Uganda, to help establish a recovery program for the residents of a district called Lukodi. The LRA rebels massacred 50 - 60 people (estimated to be more) in one afternoon in 2004, and the local residents are only now beginning to re-establish themselves in relative peace. The villagers have leadership groups (mainly women) who have plans for the future, which includes schooling for their children, crops for food and to sell, and small businesses to assist everybody in the overall recovery.

In the middle of this, is a young man called Sunday. He is the pushbike rider, whose job it is to support the villages in their programs. He visits the villages every day, riding his pushbike from Gulu to Lukodi over some of the worst roads I have ever seen. The plan is to get Sunday a motor bike. Now this immediately got my attention, and I have taken on the role of raising some money to assist the Adelaide based aid group "Bright Futures" to get him just that......and the cost is only \$2500 (Australian dollars) ! It will be an off-road bike (for obvious reasons) but will be a remarkable improvement on his old push bike.

So, if you feel as though you can help, tax deductibility is available for any donation above \$2. I would be happy to come to your Branch meeting as a guest speaker and share my story first hand if that is possible.
