#### 29th January Day Ride to Milang

There were around 20 of us at Top of Taps in slightly overcast and really humid conditions. We set off and made our way up Ackland Hill Road, through Ironbank and along Sturt Valley Road, made our way to Mylor. Next, on to Echunga, Meadows where we went to Strath for morning tea. We then headed to Ashbourne and Meadows where then Macclesfield, through Flaxley to Echunga and into Mt Barker. Flaxley was our next town ridden through before heading down the hill to Woodchester and Langehorne Creek. We then went to Milang for lunch and some sunshine. The weather was good all day even though we had some threatening clouds. I'm wondering though whether we should call ourselves the ROSES RIDE GROUP, 'cause lately we seem to be losing some of our petals along the way on our rides.



#### 5th February Day Ride to Williamstown

5 of us were gathered at Civic Park in fairly clear blue skies. We set off and headed through Snake Gully and past One Tree Hill and then to Gawler, Kalbeeba and then on to Williamstown. We then made our way to Cockatoo Valley and then to Lyndoch for morning tea where we were met by Brian who "slept in". Next

it was off to Rowland Flat and through a busy Tanunda to Nuriootpa and Angaston; past Ivan's house where it seems a couple of our group mistook a neighbour's house for Ivan's and waved at the wrong house as we went past. We then made our way to Keynton and then Eden valley. We then went through Springton to Mt Pleasant Tungkillo and then Birdwood. From here it was on to Williamstown for lunch. It was fairly breezy in spots throughout the day, but we rode under mostly blue skies all day.



#### 12th February Day Ride to Goolwa

Around 35 of us gathered at Magill before heading to Uraidla and Piccadilly Valley, and on to Stirling, through Longwood and Cherry Gardens on the way to Clarendon. We then made our way through Bakers Gully, McLaren Flat and on to McLaren Vale for morning tea where we were met by Ken and Michele. Next on to Willunga and up the hill and on to Pages Flat Road on to Myponga, Yankalilla and turned along Hindmarsh Valley Road, Sawpit Road, over the ford, which from the sound of it, caught a few out who almost got airborne. We then headed towards Victor Harbor before turning along Waterport Road to the coast and past Goolwa Airport and on to Goolwa for lunch. It was a perfect day for riding, cool, clear and fine. It was good to see so many folk out enjoying themselves in some fine countryside.

#### 4th March Day Ride to Normanville

Around 16 of us gathered at Macca's at Magill, the weather was fine and we set off up Greenhill Road avoiding the Clean Up Australia folk scattered along the side of the road. We eventually made our way to Forest Range, Swamp Road and into Lenswood, then Lobethal and Mt Torrens. From here it was on to Springhead and then to Balhannah for morning tea. It seems one of our group got a



little confused as, when you are a corner marshall, to have your indicator showing the actual direction the ride is progressing; no names mentioned to incriminate the guilty, but his initials are TONY JARMAN. From Balhannah we made our way to Baldhills Road and Wistow, then a quick blap down the hill took us to Strath and Macclesfield making sure no one got caught speeding by the copper parked on the side of the road. We then went to Meadows and along Bull Creek Road, through Nangkita to Mt Compass, back up to Pages Flat Road to Myponga, over the dam wall and on to Normanville for lunch. It was a great day's riding in fine and cool conditions just the way it's meant to be.



#### 18th March Day Ride to Lyndoch

There were around 40 of us gathered at Top of Taps in cool and fine conditions. We headed off made our way to Education Road and then zigged and zagged our way through Cherry Gardens and towards Ironbank. We turned off before Ironbank and headed towards Stirling and past Warrawong to Mylor. Next, it was on to Echunga and then Meadows, where some were disappointed 'cause we went along Paris Creek Road instead of Bull Creek Road, and to Strath for morning tea. Boy, was it busy here! We then went to Wistow and along Bald Hills Road before going through Mt Barker Springs and past Mt Barker summit to Nairne, then towards Woodside and through Charleston to Mt Torrens. Birdwood was next on the list and then we headed to Williamstown and on to Lyndoch for lunch under the pavilion and out of the bright sunshine. It was good to see so many folk out today, I guess the weather had something to do with that.

After winning the Doll section of the 'Zonta Needle Craft Exhibition' with my doll, Beth, the Bad Fairy, my thoughts are what's next. Yes, I am truly addicted to creating cloth dolls and creatures.

In the Zonta bi-annual event, I have managed to win a prize each exhibition since 1996. I call myself lucky, but others say talented. There is always tough competition. Coming up with something that catches the judge's eye is challenging. Beth took me about 3 weeks to complete. It still amazes me how a flat piece of fabric turns into something truly unique.

My favourite part is the face - I use a technique called needle sculpting. Manoeuvring the stuffing of the face into a nose, eyes, etc., is exciting as I see this creature taking form.

Over the years, I have developed my own techniques on doll making, and enjoy making dolls for friends and family. My husband, Roger, tells all that visit our home, 'Welcome to the dolls' house'. True! They invade every room.


I took up sewing as a hobby in 1994 when I moved to S.A. from NSW. Hadn't sewn a stitch before that. I met up with a great bunch of girls and started quilting, but that wasn't me, although I have won prizes for my quilts. I started taking porcelain doll classes, but found I always managed to break the green ware, so I moved to cloth (can't break that).

I started with simple country style dolls, but then discovered needle sculpting and haven't looked back. I also enjoy folk art painting, stump work embroidery, beading, you name it, all of which I use in the making of my dolls. I have now progressed into art doll techniques one of which I use a soldering iron (which I acquired from hubby) to burn the fabric. This is how Beth's fairy wings were made: free motion embroidery on organza then cut out and burnt with the soldering iron.

Watch your sheds boys don't know what I will need next. (haha).

**The Zonta Club of Fleurieu Peninsula** held its 10th. Needle Craft Exhibition, "Stitched with Love", in February, this year.

Held every 2 years at Victor Harbor, the exhibition gives needle workers the opportunity to display their finished items of their craft to the thousands who flock to the event. The exhibition draws up to 300 entries each year.

Needlework is a broad term for the handicrafts of decorative sewing and textile arts, and includes anything that uses a needle for construction, including crafts using a crochet hook or tatting shuttle, and those that use varieties of textiles.

## **Snippets from John Crowe's Great Adventure Diary**

#### Saturday, January 28, 2012

Don't know that I was really ready for Peru. It starts to reshape your mental construct of what S America is all about. The general poverty and tumbledown nature of the place reach new lows. But more of that later.

I left Arica, north Chile, later than I usually leave town as I didn't have far to go and Peru's time zone, incongruently, is 2 hours behind Chile's. However, the border crossing took about three hours, as I had to import the bike into Peru. I followed the process, and turned up where I was told to go, and it was all wrong. A kindly lady about my age in the queue behind me sorted things out in no time. However, then I had to join the "Vehicles" queue, and that took all my patience.

The ride from Arica to Moquegua was through desert to start with, with sand blowing across the road, then got mountainous. Moquegua is in a valley in the Andes, and first sighting of it is quite startling. The valley itself is green and is a stark contrast with the enormous mountains behind, the usual wash-out camel colour. The ride into town shocked me. I never thought a place could look so broken down and poor. Most buildings seemed home build and half finished. People seemed sullen and downtrodden. No joy in Maquegua it seemed.

I found a hostel that could park the bike in security for the night and went for a stroll around town, taking a few pictures as I went. Tomorrow I go to Puno, on Lake Titicaca, about 275km over the alps.



#### Sunday, February 5, 2012

I have started to descend from the mountains, and I think my body will thank me for it. While I have had no real problem with altitude sickness, life at approximately 15,000 feet can get a bit tiring. The ride down to Arequipa went well, and the temperature never dropped much below 10 degrees C, which surprised me as the elevation peaked at a little over 4500 meters. The ride, while scenic, was not as dramatic as the ride up the mountains (on a different road), which did not bother me as there is only so much drama a bloke needs. I stopped to take some photos on the way, and some in the main plaza here in Arequipa during a walk around town. I will continue on down to the coast and sea level over the next couple of days. I will visit Nazca, and go and see the Nazca lines.

#### Sunday, February 12, 2012

Feeling much better today and finally got back on the bike. Presently in Nazca, arriving 4 days later than planned. Firstly, I've been too weak to ride (having had something of a relapse yesterday) and, secondly, I was stopped by a torrent of water across the road on the way near a little place called Ocona. I had to turn back and take a bed for the night. Next morning I got up all ready to continue, but the street in the town was full of waiting buses, trucks and cars. Obviously the river was up again. Then about late morning the drivers all ran for their vehicles - it was like Le Mans start. The crossing was open. I flagged down some police coming from the direct of the swollen river and asked if it was passable on the motorbike. They reassured me it was. To cut a long story short, I did make the crossing with the help of some local lads who kept me upright in the current. However, it was a near run thing. I took an early mark that day and decided to dry out. Then next morning I had the relapse so stayed an extra day in the hostel. Felt OK today and finally made it to Nazca. Not sure I will bother with the Nazca Lines, but will probably continue north tomorrow.

#### Friday, February 24, 2012

Today I rode about 450 km from Cuenca to Quito, the capital city of Ecuador. I left at 7am and checked in here at about 4pm, having pushed it a bit to arrive not too late. The ride was mostly through the Andes, and, except for the last approximately 150 km, was very beautiful. The countryside, apart from being very mountainous, was lush, green and fertile, with a lot of dairy farms and other agricultural activity. The cultivation on some of the mountain slopes was amazing given the gradients. No machinery here, just Mum, Dad and the kids out with a hoe each. Notwithstanding, the countryside looked reasonably prosperous, and as far as you can tell, peaceful. The weather was kind to me, and so, it was a very enjoyable and memorable experience. The last 150 km was flat country side, so the going was much quicker, though not as scenic. I found the hotel here in Quito OK, having remembered the way from El Centro from the time I spent here at the language school. Kathy arrives tomorrow night on a Delta flight from Atlanta, and I have arranged for a driver and car for me to go and meet her and bring her back to the hotel.

#### Saturday, March 3, 2012

The Equator lies just to the north of Quito, and the locals have build a monument there to mark it. The monument and park is called Mitad del Mundo (Middle of the Earth), and on the 3rd March, Kathy and I took a taxi up to have a look. Well, there are two Equator lines if you believe what goes on there - one determined by the ancient surveyors and a new one according to GPS (WSG 84 versus ??? - above my pay grade). The 'official' one has the big monument to mark it, the other (GPS) has a museum called Inti Nan. The taxi driver took us to Inti Nan first, and we paid \$3 each to do the tour. The tour consisted mostly of 'tricks' associated with the Coriolis force etc. For example, pull the plug and watch the water spin this way in the northern hemisphere, and the other way a couple of meters away in the southern hemisphere. It was a bit gimmicky, but we enjoyed it. The official Equator has local attractions associated with it too - for example a theatre given over to astronomy - and the usual tourist attractions. We had our photographs taken straddling both "Equator" lines, as you do when playing the tourist.

The deal with the taxi driver was he waited two hours for us, and then would bring us back to the hotel. Two hours was enough. We enjoyed the visit, but there is only so much you can do in these places. So, a leg in each of the Western and Eastern hemispheres at Greenwich, UK, in 1997, and now a leg in each of the Northern and Southern hemispheres in Equador in 2012. Of course, this means for me and my odyssey that I will soon be riding my bike in the northern hemisphere, which means Alaska is all that much closer! Certainly I am over half way in my odyssey, and looking forward to getting to North America and 'civilization' as I know and love it.



**On Sunday the 4th of March** Kathy and I flew to the Galapagos Islands to join the good boat "Eden" to enjoy what the islands have to offer. The plan was to go cruising around the islands, to go swimming and snorkeling, to enjoy the wildlife and the peace and quiet. We were successful in all aims, and the time flew. Another couple of days would have been good. None-the-less, it was excellent R & R, and refreshing for the body and soul.

The Galapagos airfield is on the island of Baltra, and we needed to catch a bus to the dock, and then board one of Eden's dinghies to join the boat.

The abundance of life on the ground, in the air, on the water and under the water was amazing. Not only were there many different species, but each species was prolific. All this was set in a magnificent part of the world that seems to be well managed by the Ecuadorian government. There are only 25,000 people in the Galapagos Province and the vast majority of the land is parkland reserved for the animals. All animals, except the iguana - an introduced species - evolved with no natural predators (well most species). Thus they have no fear of humans, and tend to ignore what human activity there is. This gives viewing the animals an uniqueness I have not found anywhere else. Overall a great experience.





The good news is I'm NOT in Peru. Enough said!

I left Tumbes, Peru, this morning and took the road up the mountain to Cuenca, Ecuador. Border crossings went very smoothly - I was the only one there on both sides. The ride was really pretty until it started to rain. Then the fog. Not a bikers dream run, let me tell you. I was lucky to find a really good place to stay for the night near El Centro - which is a story in its self, and a minor miracle as far as I'm concerned (a local biker in his pickup truck saw me and knew what I would be looking for. His family own the apartments where I'm staying - three rooms and \$35.)

Cuenca is a beautiful old city - I think it has a world heritage listing. For the first time in a long while I feel guilty about not having got the camera out and taken some photos. I think I retired the camera at my dislike of the last country I was in (I'm trying to forget I was ever there.) So, no photos this time either, but at least I'm feeling guilty, so that means I will probably drag it out again soon. This city is worth a day or two, but I've decided to move on tomorrow as Kathy is coming to Quito early to meet me, and I don't want to be late.

The difference between Ecuador and the last country I was in is amazing. Really amazing. Thank God for that.





Mitch also observed the priest blessing the eyes, ears, and hooves of the old nag. Mitch knew he had a winner and bet every cent he owned on the old nag.




He then watched dumbfounded as the old nag come in dead last. Mitch, in a state of shock, made his way down to the track area where the priest was.


