RIDER TRAINING COURSES AT THE 2009 PENRITH AGM EVENT

The Club has been negotiating with advanced rider training providers to present appropriate courses to members attending the Penrith AGM Event in March 2009. All courses will be focused on skills upgrading with hazard perception and avoidance skills given special attention.

We are pleased to announce that **HART** and **Stay Upright** will be offering these courses at very competitive prices for the week of the event. The Ulysses Club rebate will be a special one-off \$80 for each course – just send in your certificate of attendance and receipt of payment with return post details to the National Office to claim this amount. You will need to remit the full course cost to the provider when booking.

HART is offering three basic courses:

- 1. One for more experienced riders at the Oran Park Raceway (4 Hours and \$160).
- 2. One for the less experienced rider at Eastern Creek Raceway (4 hours and \$130).
- 3. The final alternative being conducted at their St. Ives complex (6 hours and \$120 including lunch and a toll pass), for all riders. The St. Ives venue is some distance from Penrith, but an escorted organized ride to and from is being arranged and this will be an integral part of the course. Lunch is provided at St. Ives.

The 4 hour courses will be run two per day with a limit on the number of participants. The student to instructor ratio will be seven to one. A dedicated link will be placed on the HART web site at www.hartridertraining.com.au with phone bookings taken on 1300 146 632. All courses will commence on Monday, 16th March until the following Friday.

All Stay Upright courses will be at Oran Park Raceway on the short circuit track. There is one course for riders for all skill levels. They will commence on Monday, 16th March and go through to the following Friday. Each course will be of 4 hours duration with two conducted each day, morning and afternoon. Refreshments will be supplied. Again, there will be a limit on the number of participants per course with a student to instructor ratio of seven to one.

These courses are priced at \$180 including morning and afternoon teas. Oran Park is relatively close to Penrith. Information and bookings can be made via the Stay Upright website at www.stayupright.com.au or phone 1300 366 640.

BOOKINGS:

You are advised to book early as it is envisaged that these courses will fill very fast.

The preferred method of booking is via the phone as direct information can then be given on what courses are available as they fill up.

As per instruction from the course providers, both Oran Park and Eastern Creek will not be available for 'hot laps' after the completion of the courses.

Three weeks in the Yukon and Alaska

The following is my diary kept during my three week motorcycle trip from Vancouver, Canada, to Dawson City in the Yukon Territory in July/August 2008. The trip was made in the company of five Canadians with whom I had made contact over the internet.

I dedicate this journal to Siggy Schingnitz who passed away in 2007. Siggy was the previous owner of the Suzuki bike I am riding to Alaska and he was an avid lover of the Canadian wilderness. I knew him, but not well.

Friday 18th July 2008 Canada time

Beautiful one day perfect the next, that's Vancouver or was it Queensland? Vancouver Airport, 25 deg and a few wispy clouds, that's what greeted the weary traveller. Courtesy of a little forward planning, I was able to locate the bus terminal where the bus for Vancouver Island was boarding. After a brief road trip, we drove onto a large BC Ferry bound for Victoria in the south of the Island. One and a half hours later, 6.45pm, I was in Swartz Bay being picked up by my hosts, Erika and Roy McTavish, and driven to their home. Roy is the current owner of the motorbike I am to borrow.

Saturday 19th July

After a good night's sleep, the first in 36 hours, my host drove me down to the local motorcycle repair shop to pick up the bike, a 1982 Suzuki GS1100L, where it had been serviced and new tyres installed in preparation for the trip north to Alaska. (Northern Yukon, actually, with a side trip planned into Alaska.)

My hosts drove me to a beautiful beach at East Sooke for a picnic lunch. Weathered grey logs littered the shore, washed in by the tide after breaking free from the many log booms being towed down the coast to the timber mills. Deep orange bark of the Arbutus trees mingled with the Cedars, Firs and numerous other species that grow down to the waters edge. A truly tranquil place where one has no difficulty communing with nature.

Sunday 20th July

A morning visit to the local Sooke Baptist Church was inspiring, due to the fact that the service was dedicated to the youth of the church who participated throughout the service. The theme, most appropriate I felt, was, IF YOU WANT TO WALK ON THE WATER, YOU HAVE TO GET OUT OF THE BOAT. As I interpret it, if you want to make an impression you need to get out of your comfort zone.

The bike performed well, but reminded me of a couple of minor modifications I need make before the next leg of the journey.

After a quick lunch, I loaded up the bike with my repacked bag (limited due to capacity of the carrier on the back) and bade farewell to my friends Lynne, Erica, Roy and children. The first leg of my motorcycle trip north was a short hop to Nanaimo, 150kms up the Island to visit friends, Darlene and Michael Boothe. The road passed through the Malahat Pass about 500m above sea level, with a panoramic view of the coast and islands peppered with yachts carrying Sunday sailors.

Thursday 22nd July

After a pleasant 2 nights with Darlene and Michael, where I gained much needed tuition on all things computer, I departed

Nanaimo via a newly built ferry to West Vancouver. A one hour thirty five minute trip saw me trying to start the bike with a flat battery when I should have been leading the charge off the

ferry at Horseshoe Bay. A push start by two friendly crew members was all that was needed to get me on my way. I think a new battery will be the order of the day tomorrow. Better these problems



surface now than in a few days time when I am well on the way north into the Canadian wilderness. My dear friend, Pam Fearn, mother of my stowaway in 1964, has invited me to stay with her until I meet up with the motorcycle team on Thursday evening.

Wednesday 23rd July. Vancouver

Well, I had trouble starting the bike this morning, had to push start down a small hill. The local Suzuki dealer in North Vancouver checked out the bike and assured me that the problem was simply a loose wire and that the battery is fine. That was all very well, but when I went to leave him he had to jump start the bike. He said that a little run would soon charge the battery. I will know tomorrow morning when I head out to my host and team leader for the ride north. He lives 70km east of Vancouver at Langley. I took Pam to lunch at Milestones in Park Royal, West Vancouver. The weather has been perfect everyday up till today with 25 deg max and clear skies. Around 20 deg today with overcast cloud.

Thursday 25th July

I am not sure if I am still suffering from jet lag, but last night I continued the habit, I seem to have acquired since arriving in Vancouver, of sleeping for a couple of hours then lying awake for three or four.

Yesterday, after a quick visit to the Bank to arrange the release of some cash, a quiet sit by the pool at Spuraway with Pam Fearn and her grandchild and great grandchildren, I said my farewells and mounted my bike for the trip out to Langley. By this time, the cloud, which had hung around most of the morning, had cleared to reveal a warm sun making the short 70 km trip a pleasant experience. The mighty Frazer River flows west from the mountains in the east, at this latitude, and in a previous age its bed was the path of a glacier long gone. The wide bed left by the glacier is now a fertile valley covered with trees, small farms and what were once little hamlets now swallowed up by the expanding city of Vancouver and its satellites.

Having left Vancouver a little early to avoid the heavy, after work traffic, I exited the highway just before the road nominated by my host, and cruised down to Fort Langley, the first settlement in BC, established in 1827, on the banks of the Fraser. The river at this point is still tidal and the early sailing ships must have taken advantage of the tides to make there way 30km inland. The community of Fort Langley have made an effort to retain the early colonial feel of the town and, as a result, it is a popular destination for tourists and motorcyclists with time on their hands.

works in the Real Estate business and, judging by his buoyant and colourful nature, is quite successful. Debbie, his wife, (second marriage for both of them), arrived home later after her day working as a nurse in an Aged Care Home. Debbie is definitely a good foil for Wes who seems to live life on the edge for most of the time.

The evening was spent discussing final plans and the route we are to take north. The irony of our dependence on the computer age was emphasized when discussion got around to how we were all going to charge our various electronic devices during the trip as we plan to camp most nights.

26th July, 2008. Day one to the Yukon and Alaska

A short ride up the Fraser Valley to meet up with the rest of the team at Mission. The sun was shining and the first thing I noticed was the summit of Mount Baker in the US state of Washington. Ten thousand four hundred feet and snow topped in the distant haze, it brought back memories of a picnic excursion in 1965 to that same mountain.

In Chilliwack we met up with the rest of the team, Chris and Sue on a 1995 BMW R100 GS PD, and Sam on a 2006 BMW R1200 GT.

After a quick coffee, we mounted up and headed east then due north to Hixon, BC 700km from our start point. Only 2300km to Dawson City in the Yukon, our final destination. We passed through fields of new mown hay with an aroma faintly reminiscent of silage tinted with stringent smell of cow dung.

The Fraser Canyon was our first point of interest after turning north. A deep ravine about 50km long with railway tracks carved into the canyon walls on both sides, one for the CPR and the other for the CN plus the road which crosses the river occasionally looking for the easiest passage through many tunnels. In the early morning light the many power lines draped across the canyon, shone with dew resembling cobwebs placed there by some giant spider. Soon we were passing thick forests decimated by the Mountain Pine Beetle, a pest that is normally controlled by the cold winters, but, due to Global Warming, the beetle survives the mild winters and multiplies to wreak havoc with the native pines. About 80% of the forest in this area has been affected.

At the end of the Canyon we entered the much dryer region around Cache Creek. The forest thinned out to just the occasional tree scattered through the bare mountains which constantly slide down into the river causing much angst for the rail operators. The river has carved its way through the moraine left by the ancient glaciers and consequently the road and both rail tracks pass through loose sand and gravel approximately 300m deep.

As we neared Quesnel, 60km south of our end destination for today, the terrain changed again to rolling hills with large cattle farms and paddocks of Alfalfa (Lucerne) being baled for winter stock food.

We reached Hixon at around 7.00pm and located our campsite for the night, set deep in a forest not far from a river.

Sunday 27th July. Day 2 to the Yukon and Alaska

After a gentle intermittent rain overnight, the tent and bikes were a little damp. Fortunately, the rain stopped while we packed up the camp site. Wes's Aunt and Uncle, who live just up the road on 160 acres, had asked us to join them for a pancake breakfast, so we drove off, in the rain, which had just started again, the few km to Aunt Penny's. It was a typical farmhouse with all welcome regardless of dress, boots and all. Breakfast consisted of pancakes, bacon and scrambled eggs for all six of us. No

maple syrup, but plenty of home made jam. Not good for my dietary control, but very nice. I must try harder to cut down on fatty foods.

The road north from Quesnel passed through now familiar rolling hills with scattered farms. We passed through Prince George, the commercial centre of central BC, and turned west towards the coast and the scenery slowly changed with 2331m Mount Hudson coming into sight as we neared the small town of Smithers, where we camped for the night in sight of the Hudson Glacier.

The lack of sleep last night, due to insufficient mattress padding and a severe case of dry eye, caused some concern during the day's ride, but I arrived safely thanks to the watchful and ever considerate eye of my hosts, Debbie and Wes.

The excitement is really mounting now as we near the coastal range which posed such a challenge to the gold seekers of 1897. The day is about to end with a couple of beers around the camp table as the sun slowly sets over Mount Hudson and casts its long shadows over my fellow travellers. Tomorrow is another day. We covered 465km on our journey north.

Monday 28th July



Oh what a day! We left the camp site at Smithers around 8.30am for breakfast downtown. As usual, I seemed fall into the trap of having a large breakfast and justified same on the basis that it was going to be a long day and the next food stop was an open ended question. The

weather was overcast with the sun vainly trying to break through the cloud cover giving us a little optimism for a reasonable day's ride. The bike, by the way, has been running like a dream. First stop was at a small Indian village, Moricetown, on the banks of the Bulkley River. The river at this point is forced through a narrow ravine which increases the velocity from dangerous to terrifying and the salmon must make an extreme effort to pass through on their journey upstream to the spawning grounds. The local Gitxsan Indians take advantage of the salmon's dilemma and dab into the swirling waters with long handled nets to capture the exhausted fish. Apparently, at this time, the catch was to be tagged and released but at other times the fish end up as smoked salmon on the dinner table.

Next stop was just outside Hazelton at Ksan an historic Indian village replica where the Gitxsan people conduct tours of the various buildings which are furnished with artifacts of historical interest. Prior to the tour we had lunch provided by a charming young Indian woman Dawn Gun-a-Noot who offered us a sample of smoked salmon provided we gave a donation as they not permitted to sell the fish under



the terms of the native fishing agreement. These are definitely a proud and intelligent people.

By the time we were ready to leave for our nightly destination,



Meziadin Lake, 200km north, the rain had begun to fall and the temperature was a low 10 deg C.

At the half way mark, my fortitude was being tested and I was shaking

visibly from the cold and wet. My boots were full of water and the dampness had spread up my legs and into my upper clothing. We pressed on as there was no other option other than to make it the lake where we were to meet up with three other members of the Greater Vancouver Motorcycle Club who had driven north in a large motor home plus a motor bike and a ford pickup truck.

At 7.10 pm, we pulled into Meziadin Lake with me suffering from hyperthermia, so I was told by Nurse Debbie. With some care and attention in the warm motor home and several coffees plus a bowl of home made soup, I was back in the world of the normal, if there is such state of being, as normal in a place like this. The prospect of making camp under such dismal conditions was daunting, but, to our surprise, our new found best friends found a most unlikely 6 berth trailer available for a small nightly fee, heating and light included. I now believe in the good fairy of the north.



Tues 29th July

After a reasonable night's sleep, two to a pull out bunk, we rose to an overcast but clearing day. Breakfast, courtesy of the small onsite shop, was pancakes, wieners with maple syrup and hot coffee. At around 10.00am we departed for Stewart and Hyder at the bottom of the Alaskan peninsula 60km away at the end of a spur road off the Stewart

Cassiar Highway.

The road down this long valley to the fiord is littered with small to large glaciers fed from the snows that fall on the mountain tops 2000m above us. We passed groves of Spruce, Hemlock and Poplar creating a patchwork of dark and light greens. We stopped at the Bear glacier for a photo opportunity and recorded the deep blue clefts reflecting the light escaping through the occasional break in the clouds and jagged hounds teeth created by the stresses

on the moving glacier.

Αt the bottom of the valley lies the smallCanadian fishing and logging town of Stewart a neat with paved street and shops.



Four km further down the valley we entered the Alaskan town of Hyder with unmade streets and Wild West shops. We stopped at the Glacier Inn, decorated inside with autographed bank notes which cover all of the walls and additional sheets of plywood. Behind the bar were hunting mementos including the head of a mountain goat. The rest of our group partook in the traditional ritual of being "Hyderized" which consists of sculling 1oz of Everclear, 150 proof grain alcohol followed by a small glass of mineral water. The effects are almost instantaneous, as observed by those who have not partaken.

After a seafood lunch, cooked in an ancient bus, we rode up a valley to a site noted for the frequency of both black and grizzly bears catching salmon in a shallow stream but due to a shortage of salmon the bears were not present at this time. There were several die hard photographers, sitting under waterproofs, who had been there all day in the rain waiting for the perfect shot. We didn't wait

Throughout the day we experienced intermittent rain so always had to be dressed appropriately. I solved the problem of water running up my pant legs by binding them with several layers of Duct tape which I purchased in Stewart.

On the ride back through the valley I was able to observe a black bear crossing a glacier high up the mountain plus another young bear on the side of the road.

The day ended with a filling meal cooked by Wes in our trailer accommodation, wine and an attempt to make a campfire with green spruce. A heavy rain shower during dinner ensured that we all stayed inside our 26ft. trailer after dinner.

Wednesday 30th July

Today the weather has been as good as it is likely to get in the north at this time of the year, around 11deg C, but the sun shone on and off for most of the day. The entire run today has been through mountains topping out at 2500m and the highest road pass was Gnats Pass at 1241m about 20km out of Dease Lake, our destination for today. Mountains, that are all topped with snow that spawn small glaciers down their rugged slopes, rise alongside more gentle slopes thickly forested with the many varieties of local flora. It comes as no surprise that northern British Columbia is a Province almost inundated with water via its rivers and lakes. Names such as Fraser River, Thompson River, Skeena River, and Stikine River, along with countless lakes, have accompanied us on our journey north, and there is more to come.


Turbulent rivers rushing through narrow gorges carving grotesque images that must have given rise to many a myth told by the local Indian tribes. Gentle, slow flowing, shallow rivers with flat, stony beds that no doubt play host to many spawning salmon. The many bears we have seen crossing the road bear testament to the plentiful food supply the region offers to the wildlife.

By mid afternoon we had reached a lakeside site where we met up with our friends, in the Motor Home, Barbara, Horst and her brother Victor. Barbara rode her Suzuki Cruiser into Dease Lake to see where we were staying then rode back to her campsite for the night.

We managed to secure a double room with sofa bed, so the six of us have bunked into the one room for the night; two on the floor which they say is a lot better than waking up in the morning rain and breaking camp. No doubt we will need to pitch the tents again soon.


