





Proposed South Australian AGM Event in 2018

On September 8th at the Torrens Valley Branch Committee meeting, our newly appointed National Secretary, Mark Seja made a request for the Branch to consider running an AGM Event in S.A. possibly in 2018 or 2019. On recovering from the initial shock, the Committee was at one that the best possible outcome would be to involve all the S.A. Branches wherever possible.

The idea was then an agenda item at the Port Pirie Odyssey Presidents and Secretaries meeting and received a very positive hearing, but the Torrens Valley Committee was adamant that the final decision whether we 'go for it' was best coming from the Ulysses Members and not the Branch Committees. The Torrens Valley Branch Committee is firmly behind the hosting of this AGM Event.

Mallee Branch President Graeme Rule, a past National Committee Ex Officio National AGM Event Coordinator (NAGMEC), was completely in agreement and spoke to the affirmative at the Port Pirie Odyssey meeting.

On a short private holiday to the Riverland Region during the following week and by sheer chance, I attended the Riverland Field Days at their dedicated site some 3 kilometres out of Barmera on the road to Monash (Sturt Highway) and noticed the great facilities there. I met Graeme there, we went through the list of amenities, and the pros and cons, and quickly came to the conclusion that it was indeed a perfect place for an AGM Event. All the boxes were ticked!!

As we anticipate around 3,000 members to attend the 2018 Event with the half these members camping on site, the facilities would easily cater for this number as well as the ever growing RV numbers. The number of hard beds in the adjacent Riverland region is around 1200 therefore catering for those needing this type of accommodation. The surrounding major towns of Berri, Loxton, Waikerie, Barmera and Renmark are close by and within easy commuting distance and have excellent hard accommodation facilities in the form of Hotel/Motel, high grade caravan parks, short term house rental, plus the ready availability of supplementary houseboat accommodation. One potentially attractive option would be to import large paddle steamers to be moored for the week at

Renmark or Berri to cater for any overflow of those needing hard bed accommodation. There are several large halls nearby to hold the AGM and elections.

This AGM Event will be known as the **Riverland AGM** and, seeing as it is within the Mallee Branch precincts, it will be the nominal host. However, we hope that the AGM Event Host Committee that will organise and oversee this National event will comprise of interested Ulysses Club members from many SA and interstate Branches including the closeby Mildura Branch.

National Secretary, Mark Seja, Torrens Valley Branch President, Steve Lennard, Torrens Valley Branch Secretary, Linda Price, and myself have attended meetings at Fleurieu, Torrens Valley, Adelaide and Lower Murray Branch where the support for the proposal was high. Graeme has personally informed Mallee Branch members. Because of the tyranny of distance, we will be unable to attend the Port Lincoln, Whyalla, Limestone Coast and Mallee Branch meetings, but these branches have been fully informed.

A Steering Committee has been formed and consists of Graeme Rule, Linda Price as the Event Secretary and myself. We have until the end of December 2014 to construct a Proposal Document to go to the NatCom for their consideration for 2018 or maybe 2019 depending on the number of applications for the 2018 year. The decision will be announced at the 2015 AGM Event in Wodonga.

We seek your comments and input on this important matter and trust that you will promulgate this information to your members at branch level. You will receive another communique in some 12 months time asking for expressions of interest for members to join the Organising Committee. It is envisaged that this Committee will liaise via email on a regular basis with a site inspection and some meetings on a face to face basis.



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My trip to (Spain, France,) Poland

The flight from Paris to Krakow was interesting. We flew by Eastyjet. I certainly hope the engine of the plane was in better condition than the interior - upholstery falling apart, generally dilapidated, etc. No frills means exactly that; food and drinks are purchased on the plane and the coffee has to be the very worst I have ever tasted, but a guess a muffin is a muffin everywhere, even if it is a little bit dry. A reasonably short journey over Germany, so not to worry.

The first thing I noticed about Poland is how inexpensive the taxi fares are. Where we were paying a standard fee of around 50euros from the airport to wherever we were staying, the number of zlotys paid were approximately equivalent to a flag fall in Adelaide! Our hotel's facade was under renovation and we started to get nervous, but the concierges were all great and a young man carried our bags up to the second floor. (No lift again.) The advantage of this hotel was that it was a ten minute walk from the Main Square, where 'it all happens'.



Arriving on a Sunday, we came across a market (mainly food) with a entertainment by a group of young Poles in national dress, and singing national songs - set the mood from the get-go.

That first night, we attended a concert by a classical pianist (whose name I have forgotten) playing Chopin. At \$20 a ticket including a glass of red wine, was the bargain of the whole holiday - even if I did have a 10 second power nap! lol

The next day, we were booked on a tour to go to Auschwitz and Burkenau Museum. The bus took just over an hour to get to our destination, where there many busses and tourists in groups waiting for their guide to get going.

It is hard to describe the experience of 'touring' Auschwitz and listen to the details of what 'life' was like for those kept there. The tour took a few hours all together, so it isn't possible for me to detail everything I saw. I'm so glad that I was prepared somewhat by lots of reading and film over the years, but to actually *see* mountains of human hair, spectacles, prosthetics, suitcase (many with names written on them), clothing (the children's clothing was especially heartbreaking), shoes, etc., was surreal. There was an example of a coat/blanket made out of human hair!

The living conditions would have been appalling, especially the latrine section. It's not hard to see why dysentery was so rife.

Although I had often heard that 6,000,000 Jews were murdered during the holocaust, I didn't know that 3,000,000 of them came from Poland and that there was another 3,000,000 persons murdered for other reasons - the priests, monks, academics, because they had such great influence over the populace, anyone with a disability or unable to work, anyone the Germans simply didn't like. Many were killed for political reasons, this when no other excuse could be found.

The whole camp area had an eerie feel to it with no bird life or wind noise, etc., and although there were probably a couple of thousand tourists tramping around, there was no noise. It seemed almost disrespectful to talk to others, except in very low tones, sometimes just touch and point was all that was needed. I was also very mindful that this excursion was important to Paula, as her father had been incarcerated there and was a survivor.

The life expectancy of the people, once they were in the camp, was three to six months

There is nothing to indicate that the Nazis were ever in the camp (swastikas, mannequins in uniforms, photos of 'the enemy'). There are many photos in a corridor of victims which are very confronting (these were real people).

Our guide was a youngish woman who spoke with respectfulness in the language and tone of her voice, always waiting for a short time after an explanation, to give us time to take it all in and think about what she had just said. Think she was the best tour guide I have ever had.



Many tourists brought bunches/sheaves of flowers and laid them by a wall that was used as the back-drop for prisoners who were shot (mostly after being tortured. I found this particularly moving, even now as I am writing.

There were many school groups visiting - the usual laughing and talking pre-tour was happening, but once they students got into the camp itself and the buildings, many, of them were walking around with their arms folded - a sure sign they were affected by what they were seeing and hearing.

The trip back in the bus was silent and a quiet night followed a long day.

My trip to (Spain, France,) Poland

The next couple of days were taken up with shopping, churches (each one more amazing than the last), synagogues, eating, beer, and generally just bumming around. We hired one of guy pedalling a car (bit like a tuk tuk). It was for a couple of hours and saw many sights. During the journey, Paula had him talking about himself - came from the Ukraine to work and sends the money back to his family who still live in there. In Australian dollars he worked his butt off for about \$100 riding a bike around the streets pulling two overweight old birds in the back!!! I was quite please to be able to give him a generous tip, because the tip went in his pocket and not to his manager. There are many workers in Poland from other countries. The wages are very low, but the cost of living is also very low. If you are looking for a cheap European holiday, I would thoroughly recommend Poland - beautiful and safe.

In the Main Square, there were living statues with whom one can have a photo taken - they are spectacular - each requiring a donation in the



I spied these two wonderful ladies (below) just leaving the Square. They were happy and kind enough to allow me to photograph them.

seemed to be sisters. What an amazing story they would be able to tell! The language barrier didn't allow for any information to be exchanged. They were a pretty good age and looked gorgeous - full make-up, flowers in their hair and lots of lace, and the dresses were long.



Another of the 'nice' things we did in Krakow was to take a tour around the CBD at night in a landau. The horses are decked out beautifully, as the driver in her hat, cravat and black riding coat. We even had a white, faux fur blanket to put around our legs, as it was quite cold at night.

On the 1st October, we flew to Warsaw. We were booked into a private hotel for two nights. It was out in the boondocks, but was really the best accommodation we had the whole trip; \$32 each per night including a sumptuous breakfast. On the first morning I had 2 large pancakes filled with apples with cream and chocolate sauce drizzled over them. The second morning, I had 2 large pancakes filled with marscopone cheese (if you haven't had this, you haven't lived), with a heap of whipped cream and, you guessed it, drizzled with chocolate sauce. Something else



A new memorial monument for the murdered Jews of the Podgorze Ghetto in Krakow was inaugurated on 8 December 2005. The winning project by Krakow architects Piotr Lewicki and Kazimierz Łatak included 33 illuminated chairs (1.4 m high) in the square and 37 smaller chairs (1.2 m high) standing on the edge of the square and at the tram stops. They called their project "Nowy Plac Zgody" which means "New Concordia Square".

The fundamental symbolical idea behind the project is a stylistic representation of all the old furniture being thrown out onto the so-called Umschlagplatz at the Podgorze Ghetto, when the inhabitants of the ghetto had finally been assembled by the German SS in so-called Aktionen to be sent to death (mainly to Belzec).

The chairs are the main part of the monument which includes also a marking of the former ghetto walls in the pavement, and a place to burn memorial candles (in the small building on the square).



Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier is the only surviving part of the destroyed Saxon Palace. The palace was constructed during the 17th century though the tomb was not added to the complex until 1925. Eerily, the tomb was the only part of the structure to survive being dynamited by the Nazis. The ashes of unknown soldiers from WWII have been fittingly added.

Ash's Speedway Motorcycle Museum

While visiting Bathurst, I visited a great place called *Ash's Speedway Motor Cycle Museum*. This is in a big warehouse and the collection is fantastic, as it covers many years of racing and the champions that made it. The collection of bike and memorabilia is unbelievable, and the photos supplied are just small sample of this guy's collection.

The bikes on display range from early flat trackers like JAP, JAWA -ESO, Godden powered bikes up to the 45deg power plants of today. The collection of vests, helmets and handle-bar wraps are magnificent. Mr. Ash also has a memorial section to the late Billy Sander, plus The Crump Father and Son Section, not forgetting THE MAN, Mr. Ivan Mauger.

If you visit Bathurst, don't miss this nor the National Motor Museum at Mt Panorama; it is a big must.


