



Rosco's trip to the Ulysses AGM in Penrith

Because the group that I have previously attended AGMs with had decided to go up to Lake Gardner to witness the attempts on various land speed records I rang, Neville Gray and asked what he was doing and thus joined the Mouth to the Mountains Run.

We caught up with a group in Mildura on Thursday the 12th March, having had morning tea at Waikerie and lunch at Cullulleraine, which is close to being a ghost town. That night we all had an excellent BBQ at the caravan park in Mildura, put on by the local Ulysses club.

On Friday the 13th we crossed the river into NSW for the ride to Euston, then back into Victoria for a brief stop at Robinvale where there is a good museum of ancient farm implements, then followed the river to Swan Hill for lunch. The BP there fortunately had one BP 98 pump and we all filled up for the ride to Echuca where most of us stayed for two nights. The second day had intermittent rain so I didn't see a lot and it was really a day wasted. Quite a few evidently agreed with me and went on to Jindabyne.

The remainder of the group split up for the ride to Jindabyne on Sunday the 15th at Wodonga, a few taking the Murray River Road to Carryong for lunch and the main group along the Murray Valley Highway, also to Carryong. The Murray River mob got split up again when the lead rider crashed, so we all straggled into Jindabyne at different times. We had cabins there in a lodge type environment and had dinner in the restaurant there to celebrate the end of the Mouth to Mountain Ride. It's worth mentioning that the road up through Jindabyne to Thredbo is very good, but after Thredbo deteriorates to a goat track and wasn't all that easy to negotiate. While it was bitumen, it was narrow, no centre line, and blind corners made riding tricky.

Monday the 16th was the last day and we rode through Cooma up to Goulburn for lunch. Finding our way through Queanbeyan was easy, the signage is excellent, but Neville Gray led the way with his GPS and found the Penrith complex without bother.

My mate, Vince Evans, had booked an excellent motel room for us, but was unable to meet me there coz he was suffering from a ruptured hernia, so I had the room to myself. There were a number of Ulysses folk on either side of me, but none of them were friendly so I kept to myself. It took a full day to orient myself, but I eventually found the way to the Ulysses site which was located at the Panthers Complex, and a cuppla nearby pubs. One was within walking distance across a park and one could eat there overlooking the river, very solubrious! The other was a distance away and was an Irish Pub with great atmosphere.

After a look around the Ulysses site, I decided to do the tourist thing and went up to Faulkenbridge to Norman Lindsay's former home to see his paintings and sculptures again. There are a number of lookouts in the area to see the amazing cliffs and valleys of the Blue Mountains.

Then out to Lithgow to see the arms factory museum again. Fortunately, I picked Thursday coz it's only open on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and I managed to get one of the former employees to give me a private showing. They've got a lot of new hand gun exhibits there now and it's worth seeing. The .303 rifle equipment was installed between 1909 and 1912 and was used up to 1958, making only the Lee Enfield Mark 111*. However they did make prototypes for a number of rifles but didn't go into production. They also made a lot of parts for other components using the lost wax process.

Naturally I took Bell's Line of Road to Lithgow, but there's a lot of 60s and 80s with rough surface before you get to the 100k section into Lithgow. It was on that section that I caught up with two other motorcycles and stayed with them until we were passed by a semitrailer that got up to 125ks in some of the twisty bits and we let him go! Fancy being burnt off by a semi!

On previous trips I have always taken too many clothes, but not this time. Because we stayed in Echuca for an extra day, I had a chance to wash and dry, hanging the clothes on a line I always carry, and using the Honda as one post and a convenient whatever the other end. In Penrith, the motel was upmarket and it was difficult to find a place to hang washing outside, so I rigged a line in the bathroom to allow most of the water to drip on the floor, then moved it close to a window in the morning sun, and finished off outside using a chair and a fire hydrant as posts.

On Friday the 20th I went up to Wiseman's Ferry, got lost a few times and had to take on \$10 of low octane petrol to tide me over 'til I could find a pump with 98. Nearly dropped the Blackbird on a very sharp, steep, left hand corner climbing out of Wiseman's and had to do a three point turn.

On the way back I went through Richmond where there is a RAAF airbase with a lot of Hercules on the tarmac, but wasn't able to talk my way in to have a close look.

Saturday the 21st was the Closing Ceremony. It was held in the Lake Marquee and many of the bikes that had been in the Parade in the morning were on the oval in front of the Marquee. The AGM followed in the Panthers Club and this was attended by 540 Members. The venue for the 2012 AGM was announced as Mildura.

After the AGM, I did a short ride up to the Warragamba Dam that supplies 80% of Sydney's water. I was particularly interested because Perry Engineering, where I was apprenticed, did much of the work on it.

I needed to leave on the Sunday to give me time to get home for a Classic Owners Meeting on Tuesday night and leave on a Run up through the River land starting on Wednesday morning. I had provisionally decided to camp at Hay the first night, but arrived there around 4.00 pm so went on to Balranald where I found an excellent motel close to the Services Club.

So the trip home was a bit shorter even though I got lost on the way out of Balranald! On the way into town I hadn't noticed the turn off to Tooleybuc, didn't even realise that that was on the way to Ouyen. So I ended up in Euston, and after an unfruitful search for the road to Ouyen, I got directions from a bird at the local police station and got back on track.

I finally arrived home around 3.00 pm on Monday arvo, all in one piece. It was good to be back!



The rider immediately behind the leader will stop and wait on a corner if the ride leader indicates (by pointing to the corner) and will remain on the corner directing other riders until tail end Charlie goes past. If you are willing to be a corner marshal then you just need to ride up front, but if you don't want the job then don't ride immediately behind the leader. The system works well if adhered to and lets everyone ride in confidence and that they will not get lost even if they cannot see any other riders.




