Welcome home to all those who travelled north to experience the national AGM in Alice Springs; I'm sure you will all have had a great time and will be




looking forward to next year in Wodonga. I would also like to congratulate Helena Gritton on being voted the National President of our great club at the AGM.

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





Guy's Far Ride 700, Saturday 12-April-2014 - Naracoorte.

My alarm goes off at 06:45. I check my phone for early starters we have 4, that's exciting. My plan is to meet up with my daughter, Jacqualine at the Caltex, Munno Para leaving at 8am. My mate, Gordon, had to drop out due to having eye problems, having emergency surgery on Tuesday. I'm interrupted by my phone ringing - it's Jacq. She had to work till 3am and has only had a few hours sleep and wouldn't be able to come, leaving just Kirsty, my youngest daughter, and I to do the ride.

Kirsty and I fill the bike as planned and we are on our way at 8:02. We head to the toll gate and are there about 9am. Our first stop was supposed to be at Tailem Bend, but without Jacq and Gordon, we can continue further. I decide to stop at Coonalpyn for coffee and a toastie, and after 20mins we're on our way. The weather is perfect the roads flowing nicely; it's a great ride.

Kirsty and I arrived at Naracoorte about 12:20 so stopped at the monument just before town for a photo shoot (see pic). We meet up with Frank Pellas (Adel Branch). He's also had a good run and has decided, due to being half way, to visit his parents in Bendigo for the week-end.

We leave the monument about 12:40 and stop for fuel. As we are about to leave, a Yamaha XVZ950A pulls in ridden by Kevin Rice, also from the Adelaide Branch. I didn't know him as he's a new member. Kirsty and I leave for the meeting point and arrive at 13:00.

Most of the riders have had lunch and ready to move on, I quickly finish registrations. We have 9 bikes and 13 people. Some are returning via the Coorong, some by the highway and Kevin heading to Bendigo.

Kirsty and I head to Subway for lunch. We decide to visit Apsley, Vic about 32kms away, to see the Biggest Flowering Gum Tree in the southern hemisphere. From here we travel a few more kms to stop for photos of Dr. Who's Tardis. As Edenhope is only about 20kms away, we go to see Lake Wallace and a quick spin around the town as Kirsty hasn't been here before. It's time to head for home. On reaching Padthaway, we stop for a toilet stop and then on to the General Store for a quick, well deserved coffee. Next stop for fuel is Tailem Bend and Kirsty and I are quickly back on the road.

We pass Murray Bridge I'm debating whether we should go home via The Hills, but decide against it as it's starting to get dark and roos will be starting to come out. We pass Monarto South and then come to a grinding halt! As far as the eye can see the traffic is stopped on the freeway and quickly building up behind me. After about 5 mins we see the traffic kms ahead is starting to inch forward. It takes us about 45 mins to reach the problem area and all we see is 3 Emergency vehicles, an Ambulance and a police car. And 1 car parked on the side of the road with no indication what the problem might be. My hands



are starting to ache from holding the clutch and brake up and down the hills, but start to recover when back up to the speed limit. The rest of the run home was hassle free. I went to my local store and got a receipt time stamped at 8:05pm. Kirsty and I covered 822.2 kms in 12hrs and 3mins.

2014 Lost Boys Ride by Les Beyer

Once again, Rosco put in the effort and organized a great ride for us. After initial meetings with 12 people confirming, Rosco booked all accommodation and firmed up the itinerary. The aim of the trip seemed to be to boost Australia's regional economy by spending as much as we could in country bakeries during the day and the country pubs at night, while having a lot of fun, and looking back on the trip, I think we gave it our very best shot.

We did have shirts made for the trip and several times we were asked why it was called the *Lost Boys Ride*. The standard answer was that we were not sure, but we are now on day five of a two day trip.

Each day during the ride, we had a Dummy Spit Award, and the recipient was given a large dummy on a ribbon that was to be worn around the neck for the entire day.

Day 1 Pt Pirie to Tooleybuc

Our departure time was set for 8.00am, and soon after 8.30am the twelfth man turned up and we headed off. Several of the wives came down to see us off just to make sure we really were leaving. The weather was kind to us and we had a great ride through Morgan to Mildura and on to Tooleybuc (only got lost once today). Here, we stayed at The Tooleybuc Motel knowing that Ron (in spite of being a Harley rider) would look after us well and that the rooms were clean and cheap. Once booked in, we all rehydrated, some in the pool and some next door at the pub, where we also had tea, with most of us struggling to get through the meal. Ross had to wear the dummy today for getting us lost.

Day 2 Tooleybuc to Corryong

After a good breakfast we went to fuel up where Brian managed to upset the lady behind the counter (normally he is pretty smooth with the ladies). We managed to get lost again, but eventually found our way. At the morning break, Mick earned the first gold medal for the trip by breaking wind in a manner that could not possibly be beaten for the rest of the trip. This was only just over one day into an eight day trip, so it was a big call, but proved to be accurate, despite many worthy attempts to beat it. After getting slightly misplaced again in Albury, we made our way out to the Hume Dam and then on to Corryong. As we did last year, we decided on the room sharing by standing in the bar and drawing room keys and names out of a hat. When doing this, you get a few funny looks, but you learn to deal with that. After settling in, it was back to the bar for another rehydration session and then tea. Today, Greg wore the dummy for being late.

Day 3 Ride in the Snowy Mountains

With shared rooms nothing is a secret and, apparently, one of our group proved to his room mates during the night that you can snore, burp and fart at the same time without waking up (but loud enough to wake others up). For breakfast, we pigged out at Hoggie's Bakery and discussed ride options for the day. In the end, three decided to do a longer loop ride while the others opted for a shorter ride and then a look around the town. As both rides went in the same direction for the first 80km, we all headed off together. With three Cowasakis on the ride it was inevitable that we would have to ride 20kms with cattle being grazed on the roadside (Terry had Rawhide going flat out through his stereo just to get things moving). This part of the ride was a bit reminiscent of the bar the night before in that we spent a lot of time dodging bullsh#t. Unfortunately, a bit later through the twisties, one of our team (Stax) got caught in a gutter on the side of the road and tried making gravel out of a big rock with his ribs. Everyone helped to untangle him from the bike and assess the damage. The bike wasn't too bad and a few bush mechanics had it back on the road in no time. X-rays later showed five fractured ribs to Stax. After a rest and drink, Stax got back on and bravely rode the next 100 odd kms through the hills to get back to Corryong. We did delay him a bit while we stopped for lunch (none of us were prepared to miss food just because he was a bit sore). After getting back to Corryong, a few more repairs were done to the bike and the family was notified, and it was decided to make a decision in the morning on whether his ride would continue or not. After that it was into the bar for the regular rehydration session (safety first, keep the fluids up) and tea. Today, Rob won the dummy for pulling up in a nice, quiet, country music town with The Village People blaring out of the Goldwing speakers, and nearly getting us kicked out of town. Also today, Terry was awarded a gold medal, this medal was for bravery. His act of bravery left us all in awe, but cannot be discussed in public.

Day 4 Corryong to Castlemaine

I stepped out of the room in the morning to check the weather and saw in front of another room out in the open a mattress complete with bedding and Greg sleeping in it. Apparently it is very hard to sleep with tandem snorers (they didn't even hear him drag it all outside). Stax made the courageous decision to ride the 450 km with us today and then get his son to come to Castlemaine and collect him and the bike.

After a scenic 80 km we stopped at the Tallangatta Bakery for breakfast. Then we headed through Beechworth to Violet Town for lunch. After lunch we headed to Castlemaine via Bendigo. On the way stopped at Colbinabbin for a drink and stretch. One of the locals asked about the ride and mentioned that if we came through Colbinabbin we were definitely lost. Bendigo traffic was a bit of a nightmare and we were glad to get out the other side and down to Castlemaine.

After booking into our rooms (Campbell St Lodge, excellent rooms and great value), it was off to the pub for our rehydration session. Brian decided to do his washing first and left the machine running with plans to get it out and dry it after tea. Once again, he must have turned on his charm, because when he got back after tea, all his washing was dried, folded and sitting by his door (there was a rumour of a chocolate sitting on top also). Brian wore the dummy today for snoring loud enough to make people move out of their room. (See bottom left.)

Day 5 Castlemaine to Halls Gap

In the morning, the damaged bike and Stax were loaded up and sent on their way. The bike was a Japanese cruiser but it was mentioned that it looked just like a Harley once it was on the trailer. Through the rest of the trip, we would send him photos and messages to let him know what he was missing (and that we were missing him).

We had a short day today, so it was a leisurely breakfast in a café in an old fire station and then a wander around town. Hawker to Blinman Easter Ride 2014 - Shane Graham

Hi everyone, my name's Shane Graham and my friends and I ride with the Eyre Peninsula Branch of the Ulysses. Easter Weekend was a long time coming for six of us. We had been planning a trek to Hawker in the Flinders' Ranges, and this is our story.

Like any ride from Port Lincoln, it's required to journey many kilometres before you actually feel like you have flown the coup and, in fact, start to relax; this time was no different of course, leaving Good Friday morning and picking up co-conspirators, Phil and Sandy Green also from port Lincoln, and Robert and Charlotte Moyse from Tumby bay.

Easter is a nearly always good weather, and this, at the early stage was no exception. Cool, but sunny, with very little wind. It made our ride for the first part of the journey pleasant. However, the real journey for us began at Port Augusta for our weekend at the Hawker Hotel Motel and where, incidentally, I switched on my bike's video camera, ready for the ride through Pichi Richi Pass - one of the best parts of the ride on the way to Hawker.

We arrived at the Hawker pub, just after 4.00 pm. Being used to larger towns and such, it was a surprise, in fact, to find the lack of eating venues, with everything shut by 5.00 pm, except the pub, which was offering pizza only because of Good Friday traditions, which I was happy with, but not so my wife. So a foraging expedition was mounted and the reason why we found out about the curfew for meals. Even so, not to worry; we didn't starve.

Now I must say at this point that we were here at the invitation of Robert and Charlotte Moyse, to ride our bikes out of Hawker on Saturday to Leigh Creek and then Sunday to Blinman. So a big 'thank you' to both of them for planning the trip and constant care for our well-being during the weekend.

We left our abode in Hawker and made for Parachilna, which was our first coffee stop (remember we are Ulyssians). It was here we got an insight to what was, to me personally, one of the of the most marvellous weekends I have spent on my bike for ages. This was in terms of riding companions, weather and the absolutely breath-taking scenery of the outback Flinders Ranges, which, in point of fact, caused me to consider writing this little piece in the first place, and at this point ,I will confess, the rides only got better.

At Parachilna, we stopped at the tourist pub for coffee and flies. While we were there, three riders pulled in on their dual-purpose bikes on a three-week trip out of Melbourne, and had travelled from Birdsville that day. So chat began about their journey and plans ending with a bit of a look over their bikes. To me, every bike is of keen interest and has a story to tell, and these guys were no exception. Nevertheless, our ride needed to continue, so we geared up and headed off towards Leigh Creek for a look see. It is worth noting that, though the roads are quite good through the area, the cattle grids really catch you out, and they were at regular intervals, which was probably the down side of the trip.

Leigh Creek was just a fuel stop, really, and a bit of a scoot around the housing area, and as we were early there, we decided to leave here and head to Copley, which was about six kilometres up the road to the end of the bitumen and, for us, the turnaround point. Copley was nice to see and the people at the local caravan park and deli couldn't have been nicer. It turn out to be a good idea to ride to Copley too, for it was here that two other riders pulled up, one wearing a Ulysses patch as well. If I see that, I will certainly go and have a yak. So, as the two people walked into the shop, I, in a very loud voice said, 'HEY, I KNOW YOU GUYS!' And truly I did; it was a very chance meeting of husband and wife team, Francisco and Patricia Piragibe from the Torrens Valley Mob near Adelaide, who was also riding around the Flinders Ranges for a few days. We all sat down for lunch and had a great catch up; it really was icing on the cake for the day's ride.

Long shadows were starting to tell us it was time to travel back to Hawker, and looking at all the kangaroo carcasses that lay along the road certainly told us that riding late wouldn't have been a smart move. So it was time to say by and move out.

Saturday night saw us at the pub for traditional beef schnitzel and an early night for what was clearly going to be our most spectacular ride for the weekend, though I had no idea at that time just *how* spectacular.

Sunday: We were ready to roll out by 9.00 am, after our bacon and eggs, of course. We headed to our new destination - Blinman via Wilpena Pound. Again, the day was shaping to be an exceptional day, cool, sunny and no wind; the down side was the Sun was in our faces a bit, just enough to take the distance out of looking. The start of the ride itself, was through close, bushy highway with plenty of curves enough to keep even the most enthusiastic interested in the ride.

One thing came to mind and that was remembering that it was Easter, an important thing considering the number of 4x4 drives on the road. But the roads were long enough to pass if we needed to and the traffic intermittent which left us mostly to enjoy what we had intended to do - ride.

Wilpena Pound was interesting just to ride there and have a look, the country surrounding us was changing and it seemed to be spreading out as we rode to the pound. It was the tourist thing or the girls' therapeutic moment. Hey! What can I say? Lots of people were getting ready to walk trails and such, honestly not my cup of tea. If I had my way, I would have ridden my bike to St Mary's Peak for a look. For us, coming from the Eyre Peninsula, it was a different world, trees and hills, and colours that just made you glad to be an Australian; the great ride was turning out better than to be expected. Our eyes were just wide open wherever we went, trying to take it all in.

Even so, from Wilpena Pound was where the ride got interesting for the ride to Blinman. And I think to describe this part of the ride? Well, I think I would fail to do it justice, truthfully. Long sweeping curves through high, rolling hills, decent open roads (remembering the cattle grids are still here), all the time looking at amazing views of remote Australia in all its glory and splendour. I have only made this ride once in my life and that it made such a notable mark on my riding career speaks volumes. I am sure there are rides just as excellent and, in fact, better, but in my life, up to this point, this was the best. I was gob-smacked to think that it's not listed in the top 200 rides in Australia some of the rides noted in the book are only five-minute rides, and this lasted nearly an hour one way. Our bikes, by the way, were all cruisers, 650cc to 1700cc bikes used to open roads and bitumen. An interesting point is that everyone I have since talked to about the Hawker to Blinman ride nodded their head saying 'yes, it's a great ride', but I seriously think these comments are understatements; it is clearly, in my view, a significant ride and worth the journey just to do it.

What is on offer at the end of the ride? There's good food at the Blinman Pub, an optional tour at the local mine, and a selection of arts and craft shops, which I think capped the ride off just nicely, except for the notable second chance to ride back to Hawker via the road we had just come.

If there was a downside to the ride over the weekend, I would have to say it was the cattle grids on the highway, but the other thing was that some of the roads go through creek beds where rocks were present on the road, it just reminded us how far way help was in the event of an accident.

Our ride back was just as amazing, but this time we stopped at various road side parks for the snapshots. I will say that taking pictures are good, but as the day wears on, if you select a place to go back to, generally the colour has changed enough or the shadows have stolen the moment. So, yes, if you think it's worth taking a shot, do it when you see it.

The ride remained the same going home - great, and I just feel that if we could have had a couple of more days in the area, it would have sealed the deal for us. To me, it's just another invitation back really.

Hawker Pub beckoned and, finally, bed. Our homes, over five hundred kilometres away, reminded us that Monday was a long day back, but through Pichi Richi Pass. I like to mention at this point that Quorn is a must do; one for the train ride and the other thing: breakfast at Susan's Restaurant which is a place of interest in itself, but also for the great food.

Finally back to Port Augusta and the ride through to Port Lincoln for snug beds and home.






