
#### 22nd Apr Day Ride to Meadows

#### 2018 Riverland AGM Rides Report

Considered overall, the rides program for this AGM was successful. This was largely due to the capability, enthusiasm, and preparation of the rides leaders from Mallee, Torrens Valley, Adelaide, Fleurieu and Lower Murray Branches. All were punctual, addressed their groups comprehensively and some made modifications to their rides to suit the circumstances.

There were 281 motorcycle rides with some pillions as well, meaning there were approximately 300 people-rides, some of course being on more than one ride. The total distance covered was close to 75.000 kilometres, with the only minor accident being a rider who, against advice, undertook a dirt ride with road tyres. He slipped in some sand but sustained only a small abrasion to one hand. An incident form was duly filed

The ride to Morgan with four ferry crossings, was by far the most popular ride, with forty riders one day. My team and I heard numerous favourable comments about the various rides from visitors who enjoyed their journeys, and I was pleased there were no complaints

Guy Malpass added a visit to the historic Herbig tree in Springton to his journey, sharing an interesting piece of history. Brenton George added a visit to the Irrigation and Steam Museum to his Loveday Internment Camp ride as there was a replica of a barracks building in the museum. Brian Cullinan reversed the loop on the Morgan run as the Morgan ferry closed at 10 for a cable replacement – he and his group made it by ten minutes. Other ride leaders stopped for extra photo opportunities. It was very pleasing to hear these leaders were so keen to make the visitors' rides enjoyable.

Someone reported that the volunteers at an historic heritage home, "The Pines" in Loxton, were hoping we'd visit them for a tour and morning tea – we gladly took up this offer which also solved our parking problem in the busy main street of Loxton where we had intended to have a break at a bakery.

The lady at the chocolate shop which the Loveday Camp ride visited daily, made a large chocolate freckle for us in appreciation of our visits.

Ian Stone, an accomplished dirt rider, took his small but enthusiastic groups on his two dirt rides. Larger, heavier adventure type bikes found it challenging, but the "chook-chasers" managed better. Ian was ably supported by Werner of Mallee branch, who kindly took his 4WD and trailer as a back-up vehicle.

I must mention too, men who offered to lead rides but unfortunately did not get the opportunity. Peter Davidson, David Barr, Barry Grace and Gerard Daff all offered. As he had an important role supporting Terry Mader, I left Peter as a reserve. Through lack of bookings and bad weather, David's Barry's and Gerard's rides did not eventuate. As reserve leaders, I appreciated their willingness which was re-assuring had anyone not been able to lead.

Pleasingly, there were no instances of unpleasant behaviour or arguments on any of the rides. That doesn't surprise me as the

leaders were all keen, competent and friendly members eager to make the visitors happy.

The daily despatching of rides went fairly well to schedule. We weren't quite as punctual as Tokyo railway station, but no ride left more than a few minutes late, and importantly the long rides were close to the mark – the early sunset in May being a cause for concern. Leaders said they were pleased that visitors were on time for departures, so the stressing of these times at the briefing before the ride, and on the Rides Description board at the booking office had the right effect.

Fortunately neither the medical or puncture kits had to be used. It was great to have Craig Todd accompany one of the long rides, and his colleague Lee ride with the other. A lady pillion said she felt reassured with an ambulance rider's presence. Happily both rides were free of incidents and the ambo men had an enjoyable ride too.

The self-guided rides were popular. These were all to local places of interest with the longest being about 70 km to Loxton village and back. Several visitors mentioned that they'd enjoyed whichever ride they had done. A lot of people took the sheets of directions with mud-maps for these rides and many undertook them.

An outstanding feature of the Riverland AGM is its site. The area has lovely river scenery but no mountains with a plethora of challenging roads. This simplified our task. We only identified three local rides, and two long ones. This meant our ride leaders were able to study these routes and become familiar with them, either by joining our familiarisation weekend in March, or installing the GPS files which Ken Wagnitz, president of the Adelaide branch, so kindly prepared for us, spending many hours working on these. This support was greatly appreciated as most of us have varying degrees of computer illiteracy.

How fortunate I was to have Terry Wilksch of Lower Murray branch assisting me. He was particularly enthusiastic, making many helpful suggestions and together we planned, rode and modified ride plans. It was a bitter blow when he was sidelined because of his age, and we were both delighted when Natcom wisely reversed the decision to cap volunteers' age at 80. Though past that milestone, Terry made a mockery of conventional 'wisdom' by working long hours in the office each day, booking in rides and patiently fielding questions from visitors. He was also Tail-End-Charlie on a 170km ride and filled that role capably too. He was a great asset to our team.

Praise is also due to my wife Merilyn and Terry's partner Ann for their hard work and long hours. We appreciated Rita's cooperation in giving us freedom to work our own rosters. None of us are 'work-to-rules' people; we were there to get the task done, we all knew the whole deal and the clerical procedures we had created and with freedom to work our own area we did not have to train others or correct their mistakes. Our small dedicated team ensured efficiency.

Our portfolio hardly engages with others, with most of our dealings being with Signage. What a co-operative bunch of fellows they were. Ashley Clark was always most obliging, making extra signs at short notice and lending us the

equipment to mount them. Linda and Peter in HQ were also most co-operative with photocopying & clerical supplies – top people. My manager, the jovial Robert Hobbit, was helpful the few times I troubled him, and I really appreciated Neville Gray giving me a vehicle permit to enter the grounds – or I'd have been carting heavy bollard weights, puncture and medical kits, clipboards and rolls each day to my car.

The biggest disappointment this year was the day of stormy weather. Rain, high winds and low temperatures forced cancellations of the long rides into the Adelaide Hills that day. Rides are to enjoy and that day would not have been enjoyable – it was somewhat dangerous. Those who booked were encouraged to go on other days which many did.

I have handed a lot of our forms and information to the coordinator for the 2019 Mornington Peninsula Rally, which he and his team are welcome to use or adapt for their event. We'll keep in contact assisting them any way we can, hoping their event is as successful as ours has been.

We were rather tired at the conclusion of the event, but it was a very rewarding experience and we were all glad we were able to contribute to what we thought was a very good final AGM event. As senior citizens we were also most appreciative of the kindness of our Ulysses friends Rob Todd and Carol Pickering. We spent almost two weeks in Carol's Barmera home which ensured we had a lot easier time than living in a tent. That's yet another instance of Ulyssians helping other Ulyssians, which is a defining feature of our great club.







## Michele's Greek Night Out

## Profile - Peter Castle

This is a brief summary of my bike life. Let's see if my memory serves me correctly.

I started riding motorcycles back in my pre-teens, in the '70s, and, apart from an occasional 6-12 month break along the way, I have had a bike ever since (almost 50 years).

My first on road riding experience was when

my cousin and I would "borrow" his mother's Honda step-through with pedal assist, and visit mates that lived a couple of suburbs away.

That ended badly, one night, when we got caught by the cops and taken home to surprise his mother that neither us nor the bike were safely tucked up in bed.

I got my learners' on my 16th birthday and then my bike licence 3 days later; I didn't bother with a car licence for a few years, so the bikes were my only transport.

Over the next 5 years, I had lots of different makes, models and sizes: Suzuki 500 twin, Cossack Minsk 125, Honda 500/4, Norton Commando 850, Kawasaki 900, then I bought a Yamaha RD250, soon upgraded to RD350 and then my 1st brand new bike, the first release RD400.

Then, within 12 months I got married to someone that had never been on a bike (and still hasn't), so the EK Holden became my main transport for a year, until I could convince my then pregnant wife to get her licence, to enable her to go to appointments, etc., while I was working. That gave me and the RD400 another



year before it had to go, due to 3 separate occasions where I had to have up to 6 weeks off work with broken collarbones; I was a slow learner when it came to twisting the wrist too early while turning a corner can be detrimental to your health and wealth.

Over the next 20 or so years, I had a few commuter bikes that

were held onto until they became unusable, and then no bike for 6-12 months, and then another cheapy to ride into the ground.

Then in 2001, the marriage ended and, after the divorce was finalised, I picked up my current bike on the 11th December 2002, the preordered Anniversary Edition Harley Davidson FLHSC2003, and 15 years and 150,000kms, later we are still together.

As soon as I had the new bike, a friend encouraged me to attend a meeting of Ulysses Fleurieu Branch, and I was hooked.

My first weekend away was Beachport on the Australia Day weekend in 2003, and then, on the way to the AGM in Mudgee a couple of months later, a guy on the side of the Freeway at Crafers joined our group, and when we stopped at Tailem Bend, I met Ken Wagnitz for the first time and we have travelled to, from and around ever since; we even take Michele with us most times.

Bikes are a big part of me, and Ulysses has been, and still is, a major part of my social life with most of my long term friends having come into my life through Ulysses.




