## Rumour about legality of Corner Marshall

It has been brought to my attention that there is a rumour going around, that the way we do our corner marshalling on our Branch rides is illegal.

I have made calls to the SA Police Traffic Department and explained what we do, and how we do the corner marshalling.

Their advice is that a person can be charged under the LAWFUL FLOW OF TRAFFIC ACT **only** if the bike and or rider are obstructing traffic.

The way we do the corner marshalling is to park well off to the

side of the road, or against the gutter with the indicators on, or hands out, indicating the intended direction of the ride; and sitting on our motorcycles, is fine.

The three separate Police Officers, with whom I spoke, do not see a problem with how we do our corner marshalling.

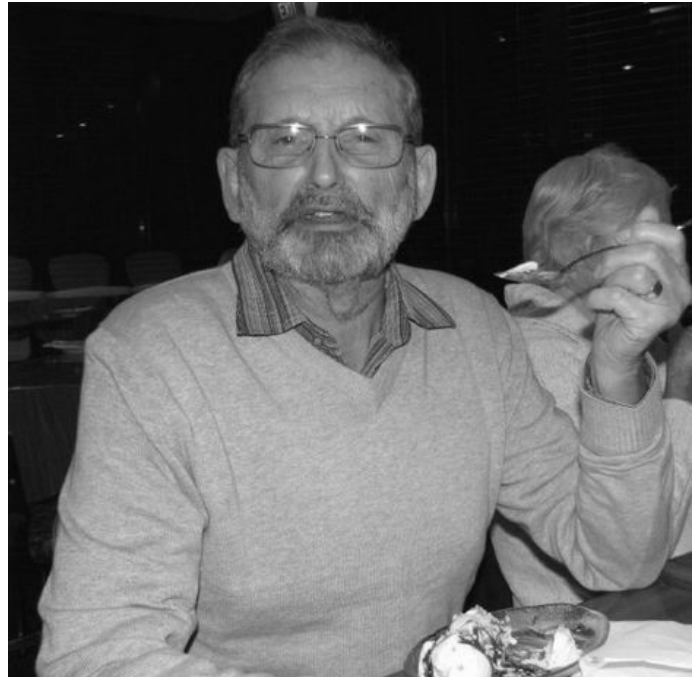

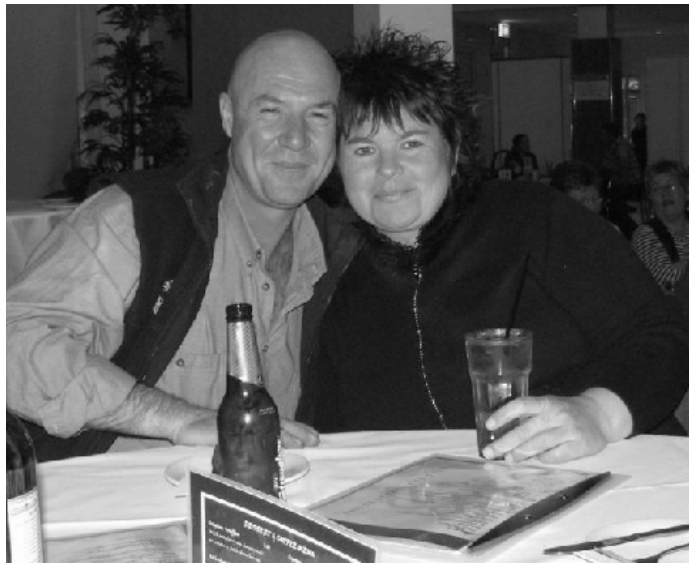

A8. I would still have a BMW road bike of 1200cc. I have never been disappointed with Beemers.

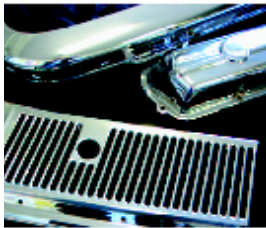
Q9. What do you enjoy about the Ulysses Club?

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## The Internet for Old Farts Analogue to Digital... (the continuing revolution)



When I joined Telstra in 1973, phones, like the above left were still common. When you rotated the dial and released it, the pulses would drive Strowger switches in the older exchanges like Port Adelaide, with a noisy whir. A series of such switches would connect copper wires all the way from your telephone, to your friend's phone in another suburb. When you spoke, the metal microphone diaphragm vibrated carbon particles, varying the electrical resistance, hence the current flowing. That, in turn, vibrated a 'rocking armature' diaphragm in the friend's phone earpiece. Thus your voice was projected to your friend's ear. The sound quality was pretty poor, if you remember.

Jump forward to now. I have a mobile phone of the model shown in the photo on the right. It not only makes phone calls, but is a fully fledged computer, tells me where I am on the ground, and has a very nice video screen. All my land-line phones at home are electronic. The microphones are tiny, the ear pieces not much bigger, and the sound quality is pretty good.

The signal between my home phone and the exchange is analogue, ie, voltage varying with voice at audio frequencies, but that is where it ends. The exchange converts that analogue signal to digital, and it stays that way until leaving the far exchange to which my friend's copper wire pair is connected.

When we had relay-based telephone exchanges, the telephone numbers were significant. Each suburb or call area had its own number prefix. That was how the calls got directed to the right relays.

But now, that significance is gone. Digital exchanges aren't that dumb as to have to use the group number to connect to destinations.

We all used to have a pair of copper wires running to our house from the exchange. Most still do, but some people are connected to the exchange via a 'RIM' or pair-gain system. In the very new housing estates, houses can be connected to the exchange solely by fibre-optic cable (glass fibre). The government's new broadband plan should see fibre to most homes (too bad about the bush).

So what does all this mean to me? (Apart from my having smaller phones.)

Well, some of the technology limitations we have now, are artificially imposed, usually by Telstra hanging on desperately to its revenue stream, and just maybe, the possibilities haven't been fully spelled out to Telstra's customers.

So I'd like to tell you about some options you may not have known about.

(The situation should improve when Telstra is split into wholesale carrier, and retail reseller.)

### **VOIP (Voice Over IP, which includes 'Skype')**

By using a VOIP phone in your house, you are extending the digital signal all the way from the exchange to your phone.

VOIP has these features:

- The number ranges are different. My VOIP number is 08 7127 0806. But the 'normal' number prefix for the Blackwood exchange is 08 8278. The prefix isn't predetermined by the locality any more. In the future this might mean that you keep the same number wherever you live, for life.
- A number of phone calls can occur simultaneously, over the one copper pair. Depending on your broadband speed, you can have at least two calls, but maybe three or four, at good quality.
- The price of calls becomes independent of where you are calling, or for how long (within reason). No such thing as 'trunk' or 'STD' calls. Anywhere in Australia is the same price, as low as 10 cents or less per call.
- You can make 'phone' calls to or from your computer. These can include video.

### **'Last Mile' reseller choice**

- You don't have to get your home phone service through Telstra. Many other companies, including ISPs (Internet Service Providers) can resell the service to you. This might save money, but even if it doesn't, it could mean one bill instead of two, when the ISP sells you both broadband Internet and telephone service. Even smaller ISPs are getting into this.
- You can save money by not having a conventional home phone service at all. This is usually called a 'naked' service. You only have broadband digital, and use VOIP for your phone calls. No other choice if you have a fibre connection to the house. If you have a mobile phone as backup, this can be safe and cheap option.
- You don't have to get your broadband service from Telstra, even if other ISPs can't install their equipment in the exchange. -Some explanation here: Normally to get fast broadband, ie ADSL2+, with an ISP like Internode or Adam (our local folk), you have to be connected to their modem (DSLAM) in the exchange. This may not be possible for various reasons. But even when connected to Telstra equipment, you can get the broadband service through another ISP. They just resell the Telstra connection, possibly giving a better plan along the way.
- So if you keep the conventional phone service and have a broadband data service, these can both be sold to you by an ISP as a 'bundle'. With only broadband and no conventional connection, you go 'naked'.
- Unfortunately, at the moment you can't go naked, and 'port' your home number to a VOIP number, ie keep your old number to use for VOIP.

However... watch this space.

## Mobile Data

- Depending on circumstances, the time might be right to use a mobile phone plan for your data, instead of a home broadband connection. This will depend on how much data you download or upload, and whether you want to be mobile. Unfortunately most if not all carriers don't allow VOIP traffic over mobile data, which could potentially be much cheaper than a mobile phone call.
- You don't have to get your mobile data service from the big carriers (Telstra, Optus, Vodafone, Three). Some ISPs (eg Internode) resell mobile data. This gives more price competition.
- Two ways of having a data plan:
  1. Attached to your mobile phone plan, so you have a phone plan, and pay extra for data. With the right phone, you can connect it to your computer and use it as a data modem.
  2. Data only. You buy or get on a plan, a USB mobile 'modem' which plugs into the computer. No phone calls associated with this one.
- All traffic is metered. Data both up and down is metered with mobile carriers.

## Free Stuff

Some ISPs provide a heap of things free, ie unmetered, not charged for.

- **ABC iView.** This service is great for watching an ABC series episode you missed, especially if you have a computer connected to your big LCD or plasma TV (not hard to do). Adam and Internode provide this free.
- **Streaming radio.** Listen to high quality music of various genres, via your computer.
- **Programs and source code.** Download files like linux ISOs, or Windows utility programs & games.
- **TiVo content.** Load up your TiVo with films at no download cost.
- **Games net.** Hook up with other gamers and play online games.
- **TV.** There is some limited TV streaming out there for free.

## Who ya gunna call for advice?

- Talk to friends, rellies, neighbours etc to see what their computer setup does for them, and how they find their ISP.
- Look for low prices in your ISP, but a) not so low that they won't be here tomorrow, and b) not so low that the advertisements you read are obviously a con. Look for the fine print, especially with companies like Dodo. Are data uploads metered? Is the allowance split over various times of the day, some not convenient?
- Browse the net. Look at ISP web sites to assess what is on offer. Is their site easy to read, and not misleading?
- See how many times an ISP has come to the attention of the ACCC or Telecommunications Ombudsman compared with their size (eg Dodo).
- When you ring the ISP's help line for assistance, a) will the person answering be in India and hard to understand? b) will they actually be helpful and solve your problem; c) what hours can you ring them?
- If you don't mind a bit of tech talk, one of the best resources for info on ISPs, mobile phones, and all sorts of other things, is <http://forums.whirlpool.net.au/>.

## RIDE TO THE ROCK MUSIC NIGHT RAISES OVER \$1,300

The Ride to the Rock Music Night held in the 086 Group Shed at Whyalla on Saturday night raised over \$1,300 from donations at the door, raffles and auctions of donated items.

Entertainment was supplied by local duo "CJ Acoustics" who donated their time to the event and kept the crowd of nearly 70 happily dancing and singing along to the classics from the 60s, 70s and 80s from 6:30pm 'til midnight.

While the patrons were enjoying the abundant chicken, salad and pastry supper donated by the 086 Group, Ride to the Rock Coordinator, Steve Woolley, explained that Ride to the Rock is an annual motorcycle charity ride loosely based on the Variety Club Bash concept with all funds raised being directed to Cancer Council DA.

"We began in 2005, when Brendon Corby and myself were involved in the "Relay for Life" event at Clare. Brendon had just bought a brand new 1300cc Yamaha and was looking for a long ride to run it in. Between us we dreamed up the idea of riding from Clare to Uluru (Ayer's Rock) and return over 5 days and then were amazed when 9 other riders on 7 bikes paid to join us.

We raised \$5,000 that year and were encouraged to repeat it in 2006 when we returned to Uluru, and 2007 & 08 when we rode to Wudinna Rock via the coast of Eyre Peninsula." He said

"We raised over \$25,000 over those 4 Rides and this year are heading from Spalding via the Clare, Barossa and Murray Valley wine regions for an over night stop at Wentworth, then 2 nights at Broken Hill before venturing down to the Black Rock Dirt Circuit Club where the riders will get the chance to test the abilities in several donated dirt circuit race cars. Already husbands are being challenged by wives eager to prove that women are better drivers" He added.

"Each rider is encouraged to raise money for Cancer Council by staging events, raffles or other fund raising activities. We have a successful Golf Day each year at Spalding and are hoping to make this music night in Whyalla an annual event as well.

Several Whyalla Ulysses Club members have registered for this year's event with Di Lehmann being our first female rider to enter on her own 250cc Yamaha. Many women have ridden as pillion passengers or in support cars, but this is a first and Di is to be congratulated for making the commitment to our cause." Steve concluded.

Steve then proceeded to draw the lucky door prize for men and women, the 16 prize 'pick of the table' raffle and auction of a further 10 items including dog food, personal training sessions,

gym memberships and art work including a pyro-graph of a classic Honda 750 motorcycle created by one of South Australia's Living Artists, John Helbig of Spalding.

"John suffers from multiple sclerosis and has found that burning images into plywood assists in maintaining his hand and eye coordination, encourages concentration and keeps him active.

"He scans a photo into his computer then draws that image free hand onto the plywood before burning the final picture into the wood using an electric soldering iron. This motor cycle image would have taken many weeks to create, before he applied a sealing top coat and then hand-made the frame.

"Our Ride to the Rock logo of a Harley approaching Ayers Rock was taken from a similar work that John donated in 2008 and which sold at Auction in Smoky Bay for \$800 that year." Steve explained.

Despite some spirited bidding on this item, it failed to reach the reserve and was withdrawn. Following a hastily convened meeting of the 086 Group Committee the work was purchased by the Group at the reserve price and now is proudly on display over the bar at the Shed.

Steve then wound up the formalities of the night by thanking all sponsors of the event, the 086 Group Committee and members who worked tirelessly throughout Saturday to prepare the Shed and those who attended and contributed to the success by donating cash and taking part in the whole fund raising activity. ## An idea 2005

Like most good ideas, Ride to the Rock was started with a couple of blokes talking about going for a long ride to run in a new motorbike. The decision was made that the best way to run in the machine would be to stretch its legs to Uluru - or Ayer's Rock as the oldies remember it - so the idea of Ride to the Rock was formed, not realizing that a nice long ride would grow to be the event that it has become.

Those two blokes, Steve Woolley and Brendon Corby, were at the time involved in the Cancer Council's Relay for Life event at Clare. They figured the best justification to go for a nice long ride like this and to have a bit of fun along the way was to raise some money for the Cancer Council as part of the relay for life. The charity ride, loosely based on the Variety Clubs Bash concept, would see motorbikes head up to "The Rock" and back over a period of five days. Steve and Brendon were amazed when nine other riders and seven bikes actually paid to join them on the ride.

Brendon rode his FJR 1300 Yamaha and it got its long run in without missing a beat. Steve on the other hand, being a little adventurous, dusted off his 1978 Honda 750 F2 Super Sport. As well as a few unauthorised off road excursions, the old girl suffered drastic oil consumption, and, after limping home, sits in the shed undergoing a full restoration.

This first year, these two blokes and their mates raised \$5,000 and were encouraged to repeat it, heading back to "The Rock" in 2006. Following in 2007 and 2008 the Ride to the Rock saw the riders heading to a new rock - Wudinna Rock on South Australia's Eyre Peninsula.

The 2009 Ride to the Rock will commence in Spalding and finish in the Northern settlement of Black Rock travelling via Wentworth and Broken Hill.

So far Ride to the Rock has raised over \$25,000 in cash and donations in kind for the Cancer Council of South Australia.

Rob was only able to partake in the first of the rides. At the time unknown to all he was to fall ill with Cancer which took him in January 2008. We will remember him via our perpetual trophy which is awarded to each year's greatest fund raiser and bares his name as the inaugural winner.

Rob's passing is a stark reminder of the reason that friends should gather and continue the fellowship and camaraderie that he helped engender and to raise much needed funds to assist in the fight against cancer.

Each year "The Rob Watts Memorial Trophy" is awarded to the entrant or group that has raised the most money for the years "Ride to the Rock". Rob was presented with the award at the 2006 presentation night.

Finally, he stammered, 'So, what you're telling me is .... you're NOT my flight instructor?'

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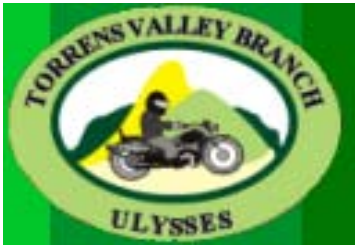

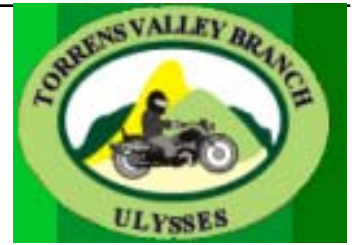

The evening was concluded with the juke box playing old hits and our own dancing girls from the Branch showing us their style.

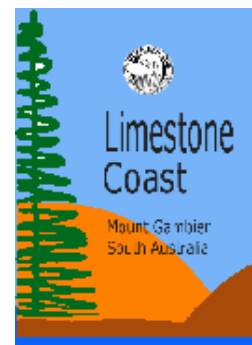

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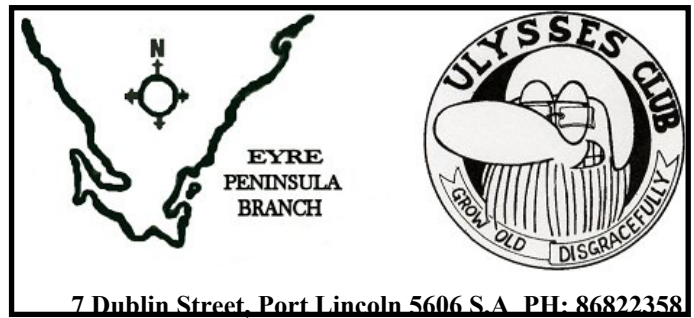

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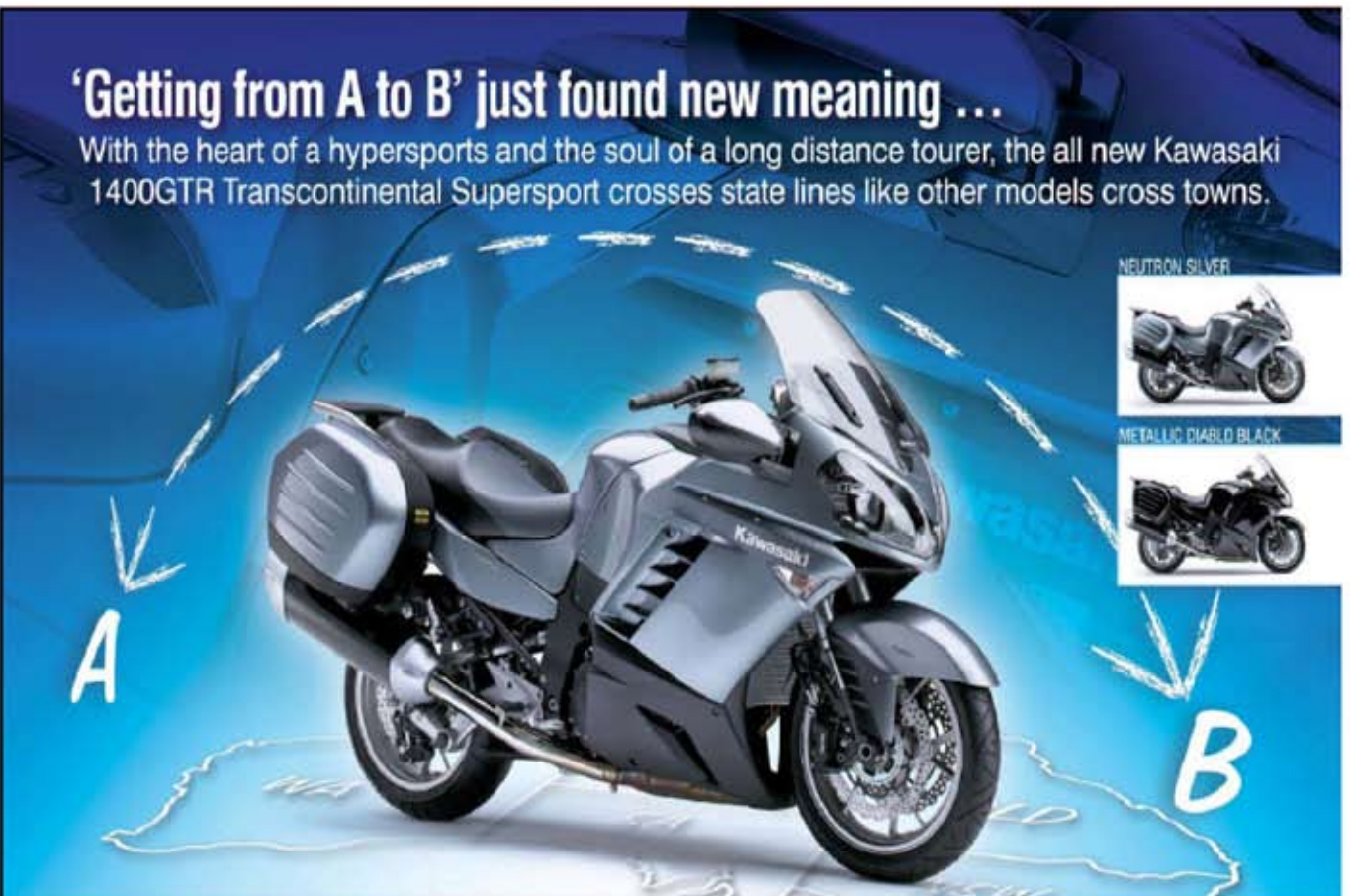


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## The Spin Doctors

Judy Wallman, a professional genealogical researcher, discovered that Hillary Clinton's great-great uncle, Remus Rodham, was hanged for horse stealing and train robbery in Montana in 1889.

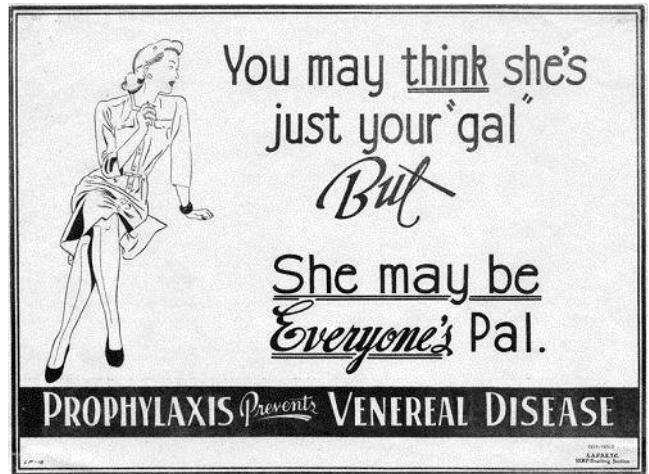
The only known photograph of Remus shows him standing on the gallows. On the back of the picture is this inscription: 'Remus Rodham; horse thief, sent to Montana Territorial Prison 1885, escaped 1887, robbed the Montana Flyer six times. Caught by Pinkerton detectives, convicted and hanged in 1889.'

Judy e-mailed Hillary Clinton for information about her great-great uncle. Hillary's staff sent back the following biographical sketch:

'Remus Rodham was a famous cowboy in the Montana Territory. His business empire grew to include acquisition of valuable equestrian assets and intimate dealings with the Montana railroad. Beginning in 1883, he devoted several years of his life to government service, finally taking leave to resume his dealings with the railroad. In 1887, he was a key player in a vital investigation run by the renowned Pinkerton Detective Agency.'

In 1889, Remus passed away during an important civic function held in his honor when the platform upon which he was standing collapsed.'

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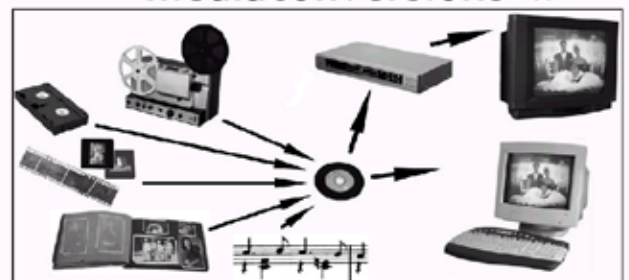
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
