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





Sunday Round-up

Thao & Michele's Venture to the Mekong Delta - Part II - The Wedding

Friday, December 20

This is the first day of official celebrations (3 days in all) when the brides friends and relatives come. We get up at 6.30am and have a shower. There has been activity since well before daylight, so we go out the back door to see what is happening. Preparations for wedding begin at 5 am with about 15 woman helpers arriving and about 5 male helpers for bar and food serving. Thuy (Mum) has already been on the bike to the market 3 times – she makes many trips in the day, we lost count. At 8am she brings back filled Vietnamese rolls for all the workers. Some of these helpers are family/relatives, but some are neighbours or locals who are being paid \$1.50 to work for the day or two. They get this money but they also eat very well I found, as they stopped 4 times through the coming day for eating. There is a constant chatter, chatter, chop chop.





The 5 men have killed a pig at 5 am. Then 3 men and 2 women take on the preparation of the various parts of the pig. 1 very elderly woman is the head butcher/chef and is organising everyone to cut up the pig. Then parts are allocated to the cooking/preparation team. Everyone seems to know their job and it is a hive of industry. One man spends all the morning sharpening knives on a stone. Every part of the pig is used – the pig has been bled and the blood is mixed with salt and pepper then steamed in plastic bags; the intestine and stomach are washed endlessly (over an hour) by a woman sitting on the ground at the outdoor tap. The liver, fillet and whatever (!) is sliced thinly for the steamboats. The skin and leftover pieces of meat are put into the stomachs of the pig for steaming (look like a big balloon). Squid is laboriously cut into diamonds; masses of pumpkin flowers, chive flowers and other greens and prawns washed ready for the steamboats. The kitchen and the outdoor prep area are alive with people. By 10 am they are still washing extra tongues (about 30 of them), boiling the skin, and making some meat dishes.

11am is lunch time break, then the ladies are quickly back to cut more vegetables & greens and one group make the pork balls. Remember they do not have any machinery to chop, so all the mince is made laboriously by hand. Another group are preparing the three ingredients for spring rolls (grated taro, pork mince and chopped shallots) and rolling them. By 12 noon 3 women are in the kitchen cooking the spring rolls – about 900 of them at 8 at a time (small frying pan!)

About 2 pm 8 live ducks are brought from the market. They have their throats cut, are bled to death, then put in boiling water for a minute to loosen their feathers for the feather removing team.

Meanwhile the young men are sorting the bar including putting the huge 20 litre containers of rice wine into cool drink plastic bottles for ease of distributing to each table.

2.30pm Guests start arriving. The bride is dressed in her jeans and check shirt but she is to change twice more that day into little short dresses and lots of makeup. Over the day and evening about 450 guests come and go. Some groups of young people, men and women sit together and talk excitedly. The older women generally at their tables at the rear near the kitchen. The men by far make up the numbers with them getting more tipsy as the day goes on. Michele as the Westerner provides a lot of the "entertainment", going to each table and drinking a beer or rice wine with them. The ritual of shouting loudly "yoh", raising glasses, and then skulling is much encouraged but Michele is careful to pace herself. The beer in this hot weather (and they add a huge chunk of ice) is very easy to drink and very low alcohol.

The band start playing VERY LOUDLY from 5pm and go until midnight. The men dance excitedly and several have a turn at singing karaoke. A couple of women dance also but that is all.

At 10pm the women are still working out the back (though they have had regular stops for meals) and they are now making 500 coconut jellies in little cups, laughing and chatting still. There is a constant washing up team at the outlet.

Saturday December 21

Michele gets out of bed to go to the toilet at about 2 am, there are 24 people asleep on the floor in the living room (helpers for tomorrow).

At 6am when Michele gets up she learns that the women of the household have not been to bed – Mother and 2 daughters - Xuan and Thao. They have been cleaning and getting things ready for today. The bride (Cuong) went to bed at 2 am.

From 7 am -2pm hundreds of people are constantly arriving for drinks & meals. Michele's job, with the two nephews is guarding the red envelope basket and giving out little red hearts for all to wear saying good luck on your wedding. Thao is busy assisting her Mother and the bride.



From 7.30am we have our band again, playing Kenny G type music to start with but quickly moving to the loud modern music until 1.30pm. When the bride and groom make their entrance in

formal western wedding gear about 8am (bride in dress 1 white, groom in his suit) a very groovy singer in a white suit with diamantes on the collar, with slick spiky hair and shiny black shoes sings a romantic song to the couple and then walks around all the tables with them.

The bride and groom have spent all day walking between the tables with the bride dishing out food for everyone and playing the ultimate host. The bride starts the day in her jeans and check shirt but has changed several times throughout the day and night.

Once again today as well as last night, some older men and some young men karaoke and dance madly the whole time the band is there. Michele makes a spectacle of herself and asks some women to get up and dance -= lots of photos & videoing! Thao says the women would like to sing and dance but are too shy. Michele thinks it is more that they are always working out the back or serving food so they have no chance.

At 1pm Nam (the groom) goes home to spend the time with his family, the day before the formal wedding ceremony.

About 3 pm the stragglers leave and we have a rest until the dinner tonight for close bride family relatives and the "tea ceremony". The dinner starts at 7pm and at 8pm the bride's girlfriend & witness arrived in traditional dress & the bride dresses in her red over yellow silk trousers traditional dress. The bride's mother is also dressed traditionally. We move to the front room to give gifts to the alter for the ancestors and the last task of the bride as a single woman living at home is giving tea and rice wine to her mother, father and 3 significant males.



As the last few guests leave, about 10pm, two young women in suits arrive. They are staying overnight and will do the makeup and hair of the bride, as they did early today (but Michele was still in bed). The bride looked "beautiful" with her false eye lashes and very heavy makeup ...Vietnamese style. Michele prefers the more simple woman she had grown to care about, makeup free. You could hardly recognise her as being the same person. We don't go to bed until well after 11 because all the shirts for the men and the dresses have to be ironed. As well as practicing tying the ties for the men.

The bride still insists she isn't excited. But we have to get up at about 2am because the groom and his family come at 3am to take the bride to their house for ever. We will follow to have a party at their house.

Sunday December 22

When Michele gets up at 2.30, the bride is already having her makeup and hair done. Everyone else is dressing and preparing. In the dark at 3.30am the groom and his family arrive in a procession bearing trays of various gifts – fruits, money, jewellery, sweets and two long candles. There is a ceremony entailing the lighting of the candles by the groom which we await to burn brightly because this is good luck for the couple. If the candle or candles go out or do not burn brightly it is bad luck. All goes well, and then the bride appears in the front room and there is a formal tea and rice wine ceremony for both sets of parents by the bride and groom. The formal giving and receiving of the various gifts takes another 20 minutes.

It is now time for the groom to take his bride with his family in a long procession back to the road and a waiting mini van.

Thao and Michele go with the bride's family out to another waiting mini bus to go the 45 minute journey to the banks of the Mekong River. It is a very joyous and happy bus load of revelers! We get on the wooden long boat and travel down the river for another 40 minutes to the groom's family pomelo farm on the river bank.

In the early dawn light, the house is festooned with lights, balloons and decorations. We are seated at the many tables set up on the big undercover verandah, whilst the formal wedding ceremony occurs in the front alter room with the bride and groom and the elders.

Then the guests are all invited to view the sleeping arrangements of the bride and groom who are now here "forever". Now it is time for another Vietnamese feast and it is little more than 7 am! Tasty meat and fish nibbles, steam boat and other meat dishes. Then the band starts and more dancing for everyone.



By 9 am it is time for the bride's family and leave. The bride farewells all her family who get back on the boat. The bride and her new family and friends will now have a big party going well into the night. And so Thao and Michele return on the boat (in the daylight this time) back up the river, to the mini bus, and arrive back to walk once more up the track to the family home.

We are all very grateful to have some down time when we arrive back at the house about 11 am, Everyone has a sleep and then rising and starting to clear up the remains of the celebrations in the front yard. Sweeping, packing up tables and chairs, packing away the crockery.

Many motor bike trips to take away the empty bottles and remaining beer crates.

Tomorrow the bride's family will host another celebration the groom's immediate family are coming over to celebrate the marriage.... more food....more chatter..... more entertaining...... more partying!....more fabulous Vietnamese food...more good companymore wonderful memories never to be forgotten.

And, of course, their favourite..... Promoting the dead horse to a supervisory position!





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




