SOME GOOD NEWS AND SOME BAD NEWS!

OK, let's have the good news first.

As a result of a Ulysses Club submission to the Motor Accident Commission some 9 months ago, I have some very good news to report, especially if you own a bike of capacity between 601cc and 660cc.

As we know, in October last year, the SA Motorcycle Safety Strategy was released and the very first objective to get a guernsey was the LAMS legislation. Now novice and learner motorcyclists can ride much more appropriate machines with a power to weight ratio of 150 Kw/Tonne and a 660cc upper limit. It seemed reasonable to me that owners of these bikes should be rewarded with cheaper registration and compulsory third party insurance costs. Previously this limit for cheaper rego was at the 600cc mark. The submission was therefore slanted at this improvement and the results came through only recently. Now the limit for cheaper rego has been upped to 660cc,, meaning that not only LAMS bikes will be rewarded with cheaper rego, but ALL bikes, whether LAMS approved or not also have this advantage. (Guess who purchased a 650 Suzuki V-Strom three months ago?) The saving is around \$120 a year and will give a substantial sales boost for these excellent mid sized machines. I know of many 650 Yamaha V-Stars in the Club, so they will be even more popular now, what with being LAMS approved and cheaper to register.

It hasn't been all good news though as we read in the Advertiser in mid June that the compulsory Ridesafe training course was to be cost effective with fees in line with the cost of production. The total cost now has gone from \$169 to \$545 for the Ls and Ps course – what a rip-off!

I knew that Transport SA were reviewing their strategy and we were ready for a modest rise in fees, but a 322% rise was totally unpredictable.

We now have the situation where the waiting time for the Ridersafe course is some 14 weeks – the Government's answer to this is to discourage new riders coming on board by making the cost prohibitive. After forking out for a bike, boots, helmet and other gear, the new rider is faced with another \$545. We already have a high rate of unlicensed riders on the road and they figure prominently in the crash statistics. What this draconian measure will do is to further force new and novice riders into the illegal category. Needless to say, we will not be sitting by and letting this happen.

On pages 8 and 9 are the details for an MRASA organised protest rally. A huge turnout of Ulyssians is expected, as we work closely together, and it is us, as well as our sons, daughters and grand-children who will be faced with this massive impost. Don't forget that most motorcyclists also hold a car licence as well, adding to a double whammy.

Coming right on top of the huge increase in popularity of motorcycles and scooters, which hold the key to our transport problems, this impost is hard to take and is nothing but blatant opportunism.





I saw you, go home to your family. But, you didn't see me, because, I died that day you cut me off.


I was just a biker,.... A person with friends and a family. But, you didn't see me.




