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
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From the editor














Sunday Ride Round Up 18th July Pt Elliott

Member Profile: Caz and Strech

How we started with Ulysses and our story so far.... written by Caz

I started my Biker life in late 1976 (telling my age now LOL) on a Honda 100cc just to get away from the kids. Can't fit two kids on as pillion, and I would NOT play favourites and take only one of them so when I went shopping or to pay bills they had to stay home with Dad "STRECH". Mums freedom...yippee!!!!. It was also more economical as a second form of transport for me to get to work (boring). I clearly remember my dad telling me "Young ladies don't ride motor bikes". I told him he needed to realise "his little girl was no young lady" ...LOL

I loved it so much I soon grew into a Honda 250CM custom cruiser. Much bigger (or so I thought). Then our eldest son, who at that time wanted transport, got his licence and also bought a CM250 custom, but his was the newer smaller black model. Mine was the slightly older and slightly larger RED model which went much faster, at least for a few months till our son gained his confidence. How quickly the size became too small, so a couple of years later I needed more and upgraded to a 450 Ltd KAWASAKI. What a bike!!! I loved it sooon much.

This was my love for many years and was the bike I rode when in the mid 90's, I was first introduced to riding in groups with Ulysses. This was with little John D, or "JD" as I called him, and he and I had a great time riding on the Wed or Sunday rides with the Ulysses groups. Strech would stay home on these rides as he was not yet riding.

In mid-1998 Strech came with me as a pillion (on the 450 Kwaka). We rode with Ulysses down to Victor Harbor and then Strech got on the back of JD's 900. We rode out and round through Tailem bend home to the city. We had so much fun together (although we almost didn't make Tailem bend as my bike used far more petrol with two of us on it). I rolled into the first petrol station in the Bend... Phew..Close call...





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Strech then decided he would join in the fun, so got his Truck licence amended to ride bikes. He started on a Yamaha 250 as a learner, but in June 2000 when I bought my current Suzuki 1400 Intruder, we made application to the Licensing board and gained permission for Strech to move up to the 450 Kawasaki. When he reached full licence state, he also purchased a 1400 Kawasaki LTD.





Having both the same bike is a great convenience when we travel as we only carry one lot of spares. We have had so much fun with the Ulysses, riding in almost every Toy run since mid-1990's, Pink ribbon ride and other charity rides. We have attended fun events like Paint Ball war games. We have also attended many of the AGM's. West Aust, Tassie, Geelong, Gold Coast, to name just a couple. Went Quad biking in the rainforest and swam with a dolphin and fur seal when up in Qld.





We have attended many Odysseys. Mt Gambier the most memorable as I got to do my spins and dives in a Tiger Moth at Robe where we stopped on the way back. Several of our Ulysses friends were riding with us got to watch me get my adrenaline rush in the sky over Robe and the south east celebratory dinners and other celebrations along the way.

Strech has helped in the running of a couple of charity fund raising events with me, sourcing many sponsors, gifts and raising money for different charities along the way.

We recently took a break from riding for a few years due to my dad's illness (helping mum care for him, being with him in his final weeks) and at his passing in 2014. Then being there to care for my mum during her later years. Strech did most of the care for mum whilst I worked. We sadly lost mum in the first week of November 2020. Due to our states many COVID changes I sadly had the task of arranging her funeral 4 times before successfully celebrating her life at a very small gathering in the last week of November 2020. Then just two days prior to Christmas we also lost our little "B-Fur". Our fur-baby, Papillion/Chihuahua (who was riding pillion on my bike the year I won best decorated bike in 2000. and she won prize in one of the pink ribbon rides.

2021 has been much brighter, starting with our eldest son getting engaged New Year's Eve, scattering mum and dad together close to their first purchased Australian Home late March, followed by a small wedding for our eldest son the day after.

Strech made the comment only a couple of months ago how nice it had been to be part of the Ulysses family, so we made the call to check on our membership, paid up our dues and returned to the fold.

We received such a nice warm greeting on our first night back and have brought a friend to hopefully also join. I was humbled at being asked to bring jokes again (as I had in the past). I couldn't believe so many remembered us both. I was amazed it felt like we never had a break at all.

Thank you all for the greeting, the welcome, and the support that we have felt on our return. We look forward to many happy rides and other events in the future.

The Top 10 MotoGP Racers of All Time



10. Kenny Roberts

Motorcycle racer Kenny Roberts was the youngest person to have won a MotoGP premier class championship in his first year participating in the event. He was also the first American to win a world title in the 500cc motorcycle championship. From 1978 to 1980, Kenny Roberts won three MotoGP titles. But it was not just the trophies and titles that he racked up that made Kenny Roberts a motorcycle racing star. His riding style was very influential and made him one of the greatest riders of all time. He was the first riders to pull off the cornering method of hanging off the bike with his knees extended, which lead to major changes in how the motorcycles were ridden in grand prix races.

9. Marc Márquez

He's still young at age 22, but Spanish motorcycle racer Marc Marquez has already made an indelible impression on the sport. Turning professional in 2010 at age 17, Marc Marquez won the MotoGP title that year, followed by another title in 2012, and two back-to-back premier class MotoGP titles in his first two years as a professional racer, making him the youngest ever to accomplish that many wins. In the 2014 MotoGP season, Marc Marquez went on to win the first nine grand prix events of the season. Many observers of the sport say that Marc Marquez could end up as the most decorated and accomplished MotoGP rider of all time if he continues on at his current clip. Indeed, at age 22, he has many years of racing ahead of him, and who knows what Marc Marquez may accomplish.

8. John Surtees

A great British racer in every respect, John Surtees dominated the sport of motorcycle racing during the 1950s. A four-time World Champion in the 500cc motorcycle category, John Surtees also won three titles in 350cc class—giving him a total of seven world titles in motorcycle racing. However, John Surtees was not just a motorcycle racer. He also raced cars and competed in Formula 1 grand prix races. In fact, he won the F1 World Championship in 1964, becoming the only person to have won world titles on both two- and four-wheeled vehicles. Not surprising that many people consider John Surtees the greatest racer in British history—whether motorcycles or cars.

7. Mike Hailwood

"Mike The Bike," as Hailwood was known, is the other British rider who challenges John Surtees in the debate for greatest racer of all time. Mike Hailwood dominated the sport of motorcycle racing between 1958 and 1967, winning a total of four world championships, and nine championships in different classes of motorcycles. Like John Surtees, Mike Hailwood transitioned from motorcycles to Formula 1 racing. However, any hope he had of becoming a F1 champion were dashed by his death in 1981 in a car crash. Ironically, Mike Hailwood did not die on the racetrack. He was killed driving to get fish and chips with his children when a truck made an illegal turn and collided with his car. Daughter Michelle, aged nine, was also killed in the accident. Mike Hailwood's son David survived the accident. The truck driver who made the illegal turn was fined £100 for the incident.

6. Michael Doohan

Australian rider Michael Doohan is considered one of the great motorcycle riders of all time. He won five back-to-back MotoGP titles from 1994 through 1998. Only Giacomo Agostini with eight titles and Valentino Rossi with seven have won more premier class MotoGP titles. Michael Doohan rode for the Honda race team throughout his career, and it proved to be a dominant era for Team Honda and left a legacy which only a couple of riders have come close to matching. Michael Doohan was more than your typical motorcycle rider. He had a knack for setting up his bike and had a great insight into the 500cc class of motorcycles. Many people consider Michael Doohan to be a mechanic as much as a rider.

5. Casey Stoner

He retired relatively young and only won two world championships, but Australian racer Casey Stoner is considered to be one of the greatest motorcycle riders in history. A two-time MotoGP World Champion in 2007 and 2011, Casey Stoner was known for his ability to ride any motorcycle beyond its limits, producing wins on the inferior Ducati bike after both Honda and Yamaha had made major advancements in developing their motorcycles. Stoner was also known for having exceptional control of the motorcycles he rode, even at breakneck speeds. On May 17, 2012, at the French Grand Prix, Casey Stoner announced that he would retire from MotoGP at the end of the 2012 season, saying that he no longer enjoyed competing in the sport. Many people felt that he retired too soon and could have accomplished more had he raced for a better team than Ducati.

4. Wayne Rainey

Arguably the best American motorcycle racer of all time, Wayne Rainey dominated the sport in the late 1980s and early 1990s, winning the MotoGP World Championship three times and the Daytona 200 once. A calculating and deliberate rider, Wayne Rainey was praised for his smooth racing style and cool demeanor. Wayne Rainey likely could have won more championships if he was not in an accident in 1993 that ended his career. Wayne Rainey was leading in championship points during the 1993 MotoGP series when he crashed at the Italian Grand Prix in Misano, sliding into the gravel trap at high speed and breaking his spine against the raked surface designed as a safety feature for race cars. The crash left Wayne Rainey permanently paralysed from the chest down.

3. Jorge Lorenzo

MotoGP is arguably most popular in Spain, and in that country, everyone knows the name Jorge Lorenzo. The 2010, 2012 and 2015 MotoGP World Champion, Jorge Lorenzo is like royalty in his native Spain. Riding for Team Yamaha, Jorge Lorenzo, in 2012, became the first Spanish rider to win multiple premier class titles. And, with 61 career wins to his name, Jorge Lorenzo is fifth on the all-time wins list. And he is not even 30 years old. This phenomenally talented racer could end up as the best ever motorcycle racer when all is said and done with his career. Jorge Lorenzo began his professional racing career at age 15 and


has been a sensation ever since. To date he is the most successful Spanish motorcycle rider of all time, with more to come.

2. Valentino Rossi

Italian motorcycle racer Valentino Rossi is still racing today, and he is one of the most successful racers of all time, with nine Grand Prix World Championships under his belt—seven of which are in the highest premier class. He started his motorcycle career by winning two titles at the lower levels of MotoGP before moving into the higher premier class, where he won seven world titles in quick succession. Valentino Rossi has led the way in the current modern era of MotoGP and is still going strong heading into the 2016 season. Valentino Rossi brought not only success but excitement, thrills and glamour to MotoGP, and is viewed by many people to be a rock star in the sport. In Italy, Valentino Rossi is one of the biggest athletes and celebrities.

1. Giacomo Agostini

The greatest motorcycle race driver of all time is Italian Giacomo Agostini. Nobody has equalled his success in MotoGP. During his career from 1964 to 1977, Giacomo Agostini tallied 122 Grand Prix wins and 17 World Championship titles, most of them in the 500cc class of motorcycles. Although seven of his world title wins were in the 350cc class of bikes. Regardless, the 17 championships make Giacomo Agostini the most successful rider on two wheels ever. Indeed, his 122 grand prix wins is a record that will be hard to break for anyone. Today, Giacomo Agostini is a legend and ambassador for the sport of MotoGP.
