Letter to the Editor by Craig McDonald 41174

The current logo conveys an image of a SOCIAL CLUB FOR OLD MEN, this is not the case, but that is, the image it conveys, and thus the logo needs to change to be more inclusive of women. How many women are Ulysses members and involved with club activities at a local level whether that be as part of the committee, the social organisers, ride leaders, weekend away, monthly dinners, breakfast clubs, Odyssey organisers or National Rally organisers? The list goes on. How many women have received the Ulysses Dearnely medal, The Telemachus Medal and have served on the National Committee? These questions need to be asked because it will highlight how women are involved in the Ulysses Cub and need to be recognised on the logo.

The Motorcycle Industry Council (MIC) of the United States, claims. Women motorcyclists represented:

- 2009 10% of the riding population.
- 2012 12% of the riding population.
- 2014 14% of the riding population
- 2018 19% of the riding population.

Industry experts predict this figure to grow to at least 25%. Among Gen X women make up 22% of riders. Among gen Y women make up 26% of riders. Further to that survey the average age of female motorcyclists in the US is 39 years of age. Whereas men's average age comes in at 48 years of age. More women are standing up to the establishment, instead of sitting around feeling marginalised choosing motorcycles as a way to assert themselves. In Australia we see a growing trend among young women taking up trades that were traditionally male orientated. I see women taking up motorcycling in Australia as part of that trend.

Australia generally follows U.S trends and I see this as an opportunity to ride the wave of growing popularity of women riders. Our current logo does not reflect current standards and expectations, and if we are to continue to be a strong club, we need to move with the times and change the perception our logo conveys.

So, let's make women feel a part of this great club, lets include women on our logo and let's see this club grow stronger, it's about time we moved with the times, what worked in 1983 does not necessarily work today, just look at today's changing attitudes and let's change our logo, because this club is not just a social club for Old Men, but a club that's all inclusive.

A weekend away by Glenda George

Thank you to Les, a Ulyssean from Port Pirie, who provided two pieces of information that formed the basis of a plan for an overnighter that included a stay at the recently reopened Carrieton Hotel and a ride on the newly sealed road to the Bluff Lookout at the Wirrabra Forest. Optional extras, added by myself, were breakfast at the Wirrabra Farmers' Market (which happens on the third Sunday of the month) and a ride up to Blinman and back with a stop for breakfast at the Flinders Food Company in Hawker.

I was intrigued when I heard that the Carrieton Hotel had reopened in May after being closed for five years. After passing through Carrieton on numerous occasions my only vivid memory of the place was the rather cross snake at my front wheel as I zoomed through - but no real recollection of what the hotel looked like. The website was enticing but contacting the owners to book accommodation required persistence and I came close to giving up. The minimum stay of two nights was initially off-putting but worked well with that optional extra of a ride up to Blinman that I mentioned.

So, two days later we headed out of Adelaide by the most direct route using the Barrier Highway till we got to Hallett where we turned onto Wilkins Way. Wilkins Way was named for Hubert Wilkins who many South Australians may never have heard of. He was born in Mount Bryan East in 1888 and was to become "one of Australia's most daring aviators and explorers", knighted for the first flight across the North Polar ice-cap and recognised internationally for his achievements. A WHOLE 37.7km of highway between Hallett and Jamestown have been named after him. I have since discovered that the homestead where he was born has been restored and can be visited. For more information visit:

We were soon in Jamestown and turning right onto the RM Williams Way. Reginal Murray Williams, or RM as he was known, was born nearby in Belalie North. He is a household name in South Australia, was awarded an Order of Australia and had 228 km of highway named after him.

Along the RM Williams Way is Orroroo which we usually aren't tempted to stop at. But the town had got behind Mental Health Month in a big way with Out of the Blue Orroroo. The main street was a splash of blue ribbon and was buzzing with activity. There was an over representation of Moto Guzzi's parked in the street and we wondered if they were involved, participating or just stopped by chance.

Carrieton is not quite an hour up the road. It is typical of many small towns in the area consisting of a cluster of houses. When we arrived mid-afternoon, not a soul was in sight. Our host greeted us, drill in hand, and the unanswered emails and phone calls made sense. Renovations.

The building has been restored respectfully and tastefully finished with enough modern touches to ensure comfort. And most importantly the meals were good. Thanks Les.

The caravan park is on the site of the old school, utilizing the buildings for accommodation and facilities. The oval and surrounding shade trees provide a pleasant setting. The \$25 a night for a powered site on grass and a short walk to the hotel (where the meals are good) have earned it a spot on my Places to Remember List.

Carrieton to Blinman is only 180k, so the next morning was a leisurely start. Passing through Craddock we had the answer to where the Moto Guzzi riders were headed. They we camped in the scrub next to the hotel. We were heading to Hawker for breakfast at the Flinders Food Company. We had stopped there earlier in the year and were impressed with the food and the fact that everything was made on site, right down to smoking their

own bacon. Moto Guzzi's arrived in dribs and drabs and disappeared into the main street. We wondered where they were headed.

There is no petrol at Blinman so we called into Wilpena Pound for petrol. The road from the Wilpena Pound turn off to Blinman is high on our Roads to Remember List. The scenery is stunning and the road a pleasure to ride. Parked outside the Blinman Hotel was a small cluster of bikes that turned out to belong to Far Riders who were at various stages in their 1000k Ride to Lunch. We found an outdoor spot to watch the world by....

The beauty of a round trip is you get to do it twice. As we headed back, the Moto Guzzi's flashed by in dribs and drabs in the opposite direction. It was more than a fair bet they were headed for Blinman.

As we approached Craddock we wondered what the attraction was for those Moto Guzzi riders that had camped there and decided to stop and check it out. The accommodation in the historic pub had recently been given some attention and the bathrooms renovated. I was charmed. Somewhere along the line the accommodation has been sidelined and looks neglected but a brand new dining area and playground has been added to cater for the locals from Hawker that still come for meals, and the campers that are welcome to stay for free in the scrub surrounding the pub. An ensuite toilet/showers are left unlocked for the use of the campers.

Back at Carrieton, over a map and a beer on the veranda the route for the next day unfolded. A visit to the main bar confirmed it could be done on sealed roads: Orroroo, Pekina, Murraytown. The Pekina to Murraytown section was a pleasant ride winding from one valley to the next. I've added that one to my List of Places/Roads to Remember.

The Wirrabra Markets open at 9a.m. with the sounding of a bell. We missed that bit but were in time for a breakfast BBQ and an update on the condition of the dirt section of road out to The Bluff. Of the two options we choose the road that heads straight out of the centre of town and through the Wirrabara Forest. That involved about 6k of gravel road, the first few being seriously corrugated, with the rest having the potential to go the same way. The new sealed section snakes up the hill to a carpark and viewing platform at the top. The view out across Spencer Gulf was well worth the effort. Thanks Les. On the return we used Charcoal Road which was a really good unsealed surface. Good enough for me to enjoy the scenery.

Mission accomplished we headed for home opting for backroads where possible to avoid traffic.
